

Science Training Offered Students

Secondary school students throughout Alaska may apply for the Summer Science Training Program at the University of Alaska according to Dr. Ernest N. Patty, state University president.

Financial aid for the students and for the program will be from a recent National Science Foundation grant of \$11,040. The program, from Aug. 26, will include laboratory, class and project work in the multiple sciences.

Students selected must be of normal high school age, be in the present ninth, tenth and eleventh grades, including junior high schools' ninth grades, show more than average ability; have and support an interest among mathematics and the several branches of sciences; and have recommendations from their principals and teachers.

Social Security

Q: Just what will social security do for my family, if I should die?

A: If you are insured under social security at the time of your death, your widow, if 62 or over, may receive monthly benefits. If you are survived by minor children or a disabled child, they may receive monthly benefits. In this case, your widow, regardless of her age, may also receive monthly benefits. There will also be a lump-sum payment made to your widow or to the person who paid your burial expenses. If you contributed 50% or more to the support of a parent, the parent may receive monthly benefits.

Q: I have a cleaning woman who comes in just one day a week. I pay her \$12.00 and also provide her lunch. Should I be reporting her wages for social security?

A: Yes. If she comes to you every week, her cash wages over a three-month period will amount to more than \$50. Any household worker who is paid \$50 or more in cash wages by any one employer during a calendar quarter of the year is covered by social security. The employer is required by law to file a return, reporting the amount of wages paid to the employee, and to pay the social security taxes due on those wages. The value of the lunch is not reported as wages.

Q: I do housework in private homes. Could you please explain to me when my employers should report my earnings for social security. Some of them do and others don't—so I'd like to know

what the rules are.

A: If you are paid at least \$50.00 in cash wages by an employer during a calendar quarter, then your wages must be reported for social security. A "quarter" is a three-month period beginning with the months of January, April, July and October. Your employer does not have a choice in this matter—

if you are paid at least \$50.00,

your wages MUST be reported. Q: Just what will social security do for me when I retire?

A: If you are insured under social security (women age 62, men age 65), when you retire, you will receive monthly benefits for the rest of your life. A wife age 62 may also receive monthly bene-

fits. Your minor children or disabled child may receive monthly benefits. If there is an eligible monthly benefits.
