

Wakefields Bequeath Scholarship Fund To Sheldon Jackson College at Sitka

Dr. R. Rolland Armstrong, president of Sheldon Jackson High School and Sheldon Jackson Junior College in Sitka, announces a gift of \$1,200 from Wakefield Fisheries for scholarship funds.

Dr. Armstrong and Howard Wakefield, vice president of the fishery, met in Juneau to discuss the grant. Dr. Armstrong said that the gift would be divided into four \$300 scholarships to be based on academic work, citizenship and general ability. Priority will be given to qualified students from Kodiak, Seldovia, Sand Point, Akutan and Aleutian Island areas.

Sheldon Jackson is a four year high school and two year junior college located in Sitka. It was founded by the Board of National Missions of the United Presbyterian Church in 1878. Students attending Sheldon Jackson come from 52 Alaskan communities and five other states.

A \$300 scholarship covers the cost of complete room and board for a student. One condition of the scholarship is that the student attend in the 10-hour a week work program of the school.

Wakefield Fisheries, donors of the \$1,200 gift, are principally located in Port Wakefield, Alaska. President of the fishery, Lowell Wakefield, and his brother Howard are lifelong residents of Alaska. Their uncle, S. Hall Young, came to Alaska in 1897 and traveled from Ketchikan to Nome by dog team and Indian canoe as one of the first Presbyterian missionaries in the area. Dr. Young married Fannie Kellog, a teacher at the Sitka Training School, the predecessor of the Sheldon Jackson Junior College.

The king crab fishery, which employs approximately 172 fishermen and 226 shore operators, freezes their product for shipping in Port Wakefield, Seldovia and

Sand Point. Their factory ships Reefer King and the Deep Sea carry a normal crew of 32 men.

John Gibbons, who is in charge of the new building development at Port Wakefield, accompanied Howard Wakefield to Juneau to witness the presentation of the scholarship award. Mr. Wakefield said that it was his hope that this would be the beginning of a greater effort on the part of his operation to help young people in their educational problems.
