

Annexed Islands Not Affected By City Ordinances

A clarification of intent of the City in regards to enforcing of ordinances on the recently annexed outlying islands was made at the meeting of the Council March 24.

The City will refrain from enforcing any ordinances at present, following the adoption of a motion made by Councilman Patterson. Wilton White appeared before the Council in behalf of Holiday Island.

House Numbering A JC's Project

The Junior Chamber of Commerce is working towards the numbering of homes in Kodiak.

The street signs will be installed by the City with the assistance of the JC's members. A number will be assigned to each 50 feet of property. Walter (Corky) McFarland, representing the Junior Chamber group, appeared before the Council, outlining the plan, which was approved following a short discussion.

COUNCIL ACCEPTS PLATTING OF U. S. SURVEY NO. 2873

The Council accepted the resubdivision of U. S. Survey No. 2873, following the withdrawal of objections by Councilman Frost. The City attorney was consulted as to the legality of the platting board refusing approval of a plat if it does not contain adequate streets. He stated it had the authority.

Arnett stated that in his opinion there is a grave doubt that a street would be dedicated if a plan showed a particular area to be an "easement."

Approval of adjoining resubdivision plat of lots 3 and 18, U. S. S. 1681, was likewise approved by unanimous voice vote upon motion of Councilman Frost.

ENGINEERS BILL APPROVED

A bill in the amount of \$4,457.12, for services on the City dam repair job was submitted by Hubbell & Waller Engineering Corp. Following a short discussion, the bill was approved.

The bill also included the expenses of Mr. Enkeboll of Dames and Moore, Soil Analysts.

CITY COUNCIL GOES INTO EXECUTIVE SESSION

An executive session was agreed on for Tuesday, March 29, with the assessor, City manager and City clerk present. Councilman Frost's objection to a meeting not open to the public was overruled. (See elsewhere for action at the meeting.)

TO GIVE AWAY FLOATS

Floats at the City Dock are to be disposed of by giving to interested parties, and beaching the remainder.

The City Manager stated the floats are covered with a green scum and are dangerous. The action followed his report.

COLD STORAGE PLANT LIABILITY DISCUSSED

Insurance value on the Cold Storage plant is placed at \$142,000, City Manager Poland reported. At a rate of \$16 per thousand the premium would be \$2272 annually.

Liability of the City in renting storage space and no insurance to cover was discussed. Also the possibility of getting competitive bids was discussed.
