

# 'Anatomy of a Murder' Starts Sunday

**Saturday**  
"Sign of the Gladiator" stars Anita Ekberg as Xnobia, slave queen of the barbarians, and is the true story of the loves and wars of said queen, and her lover, General Marcus Valerius of the Roman Legion who was finally responsible for the downfall of her mighty empire.

"Sign of the Gladiator" is spectacular in treatment, and is in Colorscope. In one scene, 10,000 horsemen clash with the fire-throwing catapults of a pagan empire; in another, a sultry slave dance stars Chelo Alonso, import from the Folies Bergere.

**Sunday and Monday**  
"Anatomy of a Murder," the famous book by Robert Trevor, is brought to the screen in an absorbing movie of the same name. Starring is James Stewart, Lee Remick, Ben Gazzara, Arthur O'Connell, Eve Arden and Kathryn Grant.

**Tuesday and Wednesday**  
Two entirely different films are shown in the double feature billings, in the movies "The Party Crashers" and "I Married a Monster from Outer Space."

Teen-agers on the prowl for trouble who discover the mother of one of them in an embarrassing situation, is the story of the former. The "Monster" picture tells the story of a race of monster-alien who invade earth, take over the bodies of humans and marry their girls.

**Thursday and Friday**  
"The Buccaneer," starring Yul Brynner and Charlton Heston and many more of the cast of "The Ten Commandments," is truly a historical drama. It re-creates an exciting chapter in America's history—the crucial battle of 1812, when the future of the United States hung precariously in the balance.

It tells of the part played by the pirate king, Jean Lafitte, in tipping the scales in America's favor; and of his lush stronghold, Baratavia, where he openly sold the treasures he pirated on the high seas.

of service to their fellow man, and also live a little, than be in a place where they could make more money."

Mrs. Johnson showed us to a spacious sunporch overlooking the bay where we saw some of their

other interests . . . there are two table games, finely crafted by the doctor, who, as his wife says, "can do anything with his hands. My favorite nook is this corner where I keep up with my wildflower studies and ornithology. Over here is some of our Alaskan; the brass samovar dates back to the Russians on the island and the wedding bench with the totem design was made for us by a fine artisan in Metlakatla. We keep so busy with so many things we find it hard to indulge in all our hobbies. We have just returned from a trip around the island on our boat, Wind Bird; Dr. has been trying to find time to take that trip for nine years and we are so glad we did, finally. The weather was bad but Cape Karluk and Three Saints Bay were most beautiful. We wish more people could see the island."

We were surprised that Mrs. Johnson could find time for leisure; she is head librarian of the town library, a volunteer job, and she manages the Kodiak Apartments which she and the doctor own. She is also chairman of the Alaska Music Trails program and at home, is an ardent gardener.

We knew the doctor had filed for the state senate on the Republican ticket. We asked what, in particular, he would like to see statehood do for the island, and for Alaska. "The main reason I wanted us to be a state was that I felt we should not be second rate citizens. Of course, now that we have a say so in how our taxes are spent, we also have the power to go to Juneau to raise them. What we really need is industries. Out here we must admit the Navy is our chief industry, but we may make something out of our cattle industry. We need to restore fishing to what it once was. The research going on here may mean prosperity to many native villages. I am very much in favor of a ferry if it can be financed without hurt to the state; it could make it possible for many more tourists to visit the island, and tourism can mean a great deal to us, just as it does to Hawaii. I am very much interested in seeing that people in the villages on all the islands have greater opportunities for education. We should have a comprehensive boarding high school in Kodiak so each of these children could be educated to the top of his ability.

"If I were to say anything about politics, I would say it is very important to preserve the two party system. When it gets down

to one, you are very close to a dictatorship. What we need in these early days of statehood are representatives who are concerned, not only with local problems, but with the state as a whole."

Dr. Johnson offered to take us around the grounds of Spruce Haven, on which there is a guest cottage and another home his son is building. It too, has a superb view of the lovely Bay of Shashaska.

Before we took leave Dr. and Mrs. Johnson told us of their plans to attend the Pan Pacific Surgical Association Biannual Congress in Honolulu in September. He will represent Alaskan surgeons. "We will stay for awhile perhaps, and see some of the other islands. You know, two years ago we made a


ten months trip to Europe and Central Africa. It's important to keep up one's interests. If you sit down and figure life has been lived, life will pass you by."
