### **Road Delay Raises** Ire of Councilmen

The lack of action by the State and Federal government in reaching an agreement on the construction and paving of the proposed road here, was deplored by the City Council at its meeting Thursday.

City Manager Poland reported that he is unable to get any firm commitments on the road project from the State highway commission, and at present saw no hope of the work being started this year.

A discussion then arose as to whether it would be best for the City to study further into the plan originally talked about of the City acquiring the necessary equipment and doing the work as funds would allow. It was felt that this might be the better plan, thus insuring getting roads badly needed, and improvement of the existing roads.

It was pointed out that equipment is available that would do the work, even if done on a limited scale. "We would be able to improve some of our existing roads," it was pointed out by one council-
