

Navy Completes Research Station; Alaska Sea Frontier Plans Venture

The Navy has a new Arctic research station just completed. It is called Arlis One. It is an ice flow located some 420 miles north-east of Point Barrow, Alaska—180 miles inside the Arctic polar pack ice.

Forty hours and 45 minutes after the first piece of cargo was discharged on the ice, the flag was raised over the campsite.

The short ceremony was witnessed by the crew of the icebreaker USS Burton Island and scientists who will man the camp.

It marked the end of an astonishing transformation of a barren ice floe into a going site for Arctic research.

At the time of the flag raising all ten buildings were completed and equipped with electric lights, water and oil heaters, making interiors comfortable, food and equipment stored, machinery and radios placed in operation—even the bunks were made. All that was left to do was move in.

This operation was designed by the Office of Naval Research in Washington, D. C., planned by the Alaskan Sea Frontier at Kodiak, and turned over to the Arctic Research Laboratory and the USS Burton Island for coordination and execution.

During the operation, and to provide on the spot coordination in selecting a suitable floe, Mr. Max Brewer, director of the Arctic Research Lab, accompanied the Burton Island, which is commanded by Commander Griffith C. Evans, USN, of Hollister, Calif.

Dr. Brewer and Dr. Kenneth Bennington, of the University of

Washington, flew over the general area before selecting the floe that became Arlis One. Dr. Bennington will be the station leader when the island becomes operational.

In addition to Dr. Bennington, a specialist in petrofabrics of sea ice from Seattle's University of Washington, there are six other scientists who will occupy the floating ice island. They are: Charles Knight, Seattle, crystal orientation of sea ice; George Brayton, Seattle, oceanography; John Tibbs, Los Angeles, marine biology; Renold Hanson, Seattle, micro meteorology; Robert Ditzler, Seattle, micro meteorology and radio operator; Frank Akvik, Point Barrow, Alaska, camp maintenance. The balance of personnel, from three to five men, will join this staff on Arlis One in October.

Clark To Attend Photographic Meet

Kim Clark will be among the participants in a stereo photography question and answer panel at the national convention of the Photographic Society of America, world's largest photographic organization, in Houston, Texas, October 11-15.

A biologist by profession, Clark is an internationally recognized photographer, and an active member of the Stereo and Nature Divisions of the Photographic Society of America.

Clark is a resident of Kodiak and was formerly a biologist with the Fish and Wildlife Service.

NOTICE OF THE GENERAL ELECTION OF THE CITY OF KODIAK, ALASKA

I. TIME OF ELECTION: Notice is hereby given pursuant to Ordinances No. 207, 208, 223 and 232 of the City of Kodiak, Alaska, that between the hours of 8:00 A. M. and 8:00 P. M. on October 4, 1960, at Kodiak, Alaska, a General Election will be held.

II. ELIGIBILITY OF VOTERS: Those eligible to vote at the General Municipal Election must possess all of the following qualifications:

(a) He or she must be a citizen of the United States, nineteen (19) years of age and over.

(b) He or she must be an actual and bona fide resident of Alaska and must have been such resident continuously for a period of one year immediately preceding the election; and must have been such resident continuously for the thirty (30) days next preceding the election in the City of Kodiak, Alaska.

(c) He or she must be able to read and write the English language as prescribed and proved in Title 38, Chapter 1, Section 2, Compiled Laws of Alaska, 1949 and not be barred by any other permission of law from voting.

III. OFFICES TO BE FILLED:

(a) The following offices will be filled at said election:

1. City Councilmen—3 year term (two to be elected)
2. City Councilman—1 year term (one to be elected)

IV. REGISTRATION REQUIRED: Registration shall be by signing a

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Poll Registration Book at the polling place prior to voting.

V. POLLING PLACE: The polling place shall be the City Hall.

VI. NOMINATION OF CANDIDATES, MANNER OF: Any qualified elector of the City may be nominated for elective office by petition of any twenty-five (25) such electors, who shall be designated as his sponsors. No elector shall sign more than one Petition (except as to councilmen in which case as many petitions may be signed as there are vacancies for the position of councilmen), and should an elector do so, his signa-

ture shall be void except as to the petition first filed. With each signature shall be stated the place of residence of the signer, giving the street and number or lot and City block or other description sufficient to identify it. Nominating petitions shall be signed and filed with the City Clerk not earlier than twenty (20) days nor later than seven (7) days before the election, otherwise they shall be unacceptable.
