2 Doctors Are Charged Mayhem Says GOP And Liberty League To Enslave People DEVELOPMENT FASCISTS TO BE NECESSITY

FARLEY ATTACKS LIBERTY LEAGUE AS ALLY OF G. O. P TO ENSLAVE U. S. PEOPLE

(By The Associated Press) Miami, Feb. 6. — In a direct, sharply worded attack on the American Liberty League, Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, James A. Farley, termed the group, the "center and soul of predatory powers."

Making not a single reference to Alfred A. Smith who recently addressed a Liberty League Dinner in Washington, D. C., Farley labelled the League as a militant ally of the Republican National Committee.

The League, Farley said, would perpetuate the sorry business of the Mellons and Morgans, in reducing 95 percent of the people of this nation to the status of serfs."

Continuing, Farley declared "the American Liberty League speaks as conclusively for the reactionaries of their party as does Herbert Hoover, the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, the National Manufacturer's Association. Indeed the organization is composed to a large extent, of representatives of that big business which brought the United States to the outer rim of ruin."

Gross Return Alaska R. R. Shows 14.4% Increase

"Gross returns of Alaska Railroad, from all sources, increased 14.4 per cent or \$182,883 to \$1,476,567 during the year ended June 30, 1935, as compared with the preceding year. The operating ratio was reduced from 117 in 1934 to 105 in 1935. Gross expenses of the rail and water line were \$1,557,563, an increase of 5.85 per cent and the total deficit for rail and river line operation and miscellaneous operations was \$73,674 a decrease of 58.83 per cent."

Charged Mayhem 2 Doctors Freed Bonds In S. F.

(By The Associated Press) San Francisco, Feb. 6. — Two doctors, Samuel G. Boyd, who performed the operation, and Tilton E. Tillman, who was his assistant, were released on bond today, following charges of mayhem filed against them in connection with the ster-

ilization of Ann Cooper Hewitt, in August 1934.

Neither would make any statements.

The twenty-one-year old heiress' mother, Mrs. Mary on Cooper Hewitt, did not appear and no word was heard from her tonight.

Mrs. Hewitt, it was revealed here last night thru her New Jersey attorney, William V. Breslin, desired to come here to disprove the criminal charges, as well as those made against her in a \$500,000 damage

suit filed by her daughter, against her.

Miss Hewitt charged in the damage suit that her mother tricked her into the operation, as part of a plot to benefit from the girl's inheritance.

Attorneys of Mrs. Hewitt declare the operation was performed because Ann Hewitt was subnormal mentally.

British Planning Better Defenses Empire Nations

(By The Associated Press) Undated, Feb. 5. — The Italian government stated its forces in southern Ethiopia had made further advances in the Valley of Webbe Gestro.

In London, the British cabinet, it was said by authoritative sources, was considering secret plans for the expanding Britain's system of defenses for the Empire. George Lansbury, labor member of Parliament has drafted a peace resolution which would give opportunity for debate on all aspects of the Ethiopian war and British defenses.

Sailor' Fight Is Brought Court Decision Given

(By The Associated Press) San Francisco, Feb. 6. — The Sailors Union of the Pacific won the first legal round on the battlefield against the International Seamen's Union, and then quickly asked the latter organization to restore to it, the recently revoked West Coast I.S.U. charter.

The International Seamen's Union, in an attempt to tie up the Salor's Union funds failed at least temporarily when Federal Judge Michael J. Roche, dismissed a temporary restraining order, preventing the West Coast organization from disposing of its assets, pending the adjudication of a receivership suit.

At the same time the I. S.U. revoked the sailor's union charter in its fight to control seven thousand western seamen, and then used the state court's to fight "title of thirty thousand dollars in cash securities held by the sailor's union."
