DEFINITE PROGRAM IS SAID PROGRESS

PROPOS TO DIVIDE THE
SIX MILLION DOLLAR

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4, (AP) — Officially stated an attempt would be made to ask congress for sufficient funds to carry forward a comprehensive program of aids to aerial navigation in Alaska.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4, —The Bureau of Air Commerce today announced it would submit to the Bureau of the Budget, a request for a six million dollar congressional appropriation for navigational aids to aviation in Alaska and the Hawaiian Islands.

Reports Progress

Director Fred D. Fagg Jr., reported progress on the plan for aeronautical development in Alaska, and said he hoped a similar program would be outlined for Hawaii.

Funds Be Divided

He declared that the six million dollars sought from congress, would be divided, three million dollars for airway aids in both Territories, and the remaining three million be devoted to airports, also in both Alaska and Hawaii.

Reich Backed Italy Refusal to Attend Parley

Semi-Official Source Claims The
Questions Go Beyond Scope
Of 3-Power Plan

BERLIN, Nov. — The German Government naturally supports wholeheartedly the negative Italian reply to the Anglo-French invitation to a tripartite conference.

The Foreign Office's semi-official voice, the Diplomatische Korrespondenz, said:

"All of these questions obviously extend beyond the scope of the three-power conference proposed by London and Paris."

"If, therefore, the two western powers, are really influenced only by those considerations, they would do well to bring the matter where it can be considered fully by all the powers interested in the pacification of Spain. Every other effort would only carry the stamp of a forced decision or of certain secondary considerations."

RUMOR PERSISTS MAY BACK OUT

CHINESE ARTILLERY WIPED
OUT BRIDGES AS FAST
AS THEY BUILT

SHANGHAI, Nov. 4, (AP) — Reports are persistent here that the Chinese are contemplating withdrawing from the entire Shanghai peninsula. However, no confirmation has been received.

SHANGHAI, Nov. 4, — Japanese forces trying to drive the Chinese south of their Soochow Creek positions, today bombarded the Jess Field Park area near British army outposts, while airplanes took to the air to drop a number of small bombs on the right flank of the Chinese lines, extending westward from Shanghai.

Japs Suffered Setback

The Japanese drive suffered a setback, a Chinese spokesman declared, when Chinese artillery destroyed two or three bridges which the Japanese engineers threw over Soochow Creek. Severe fighting took place on the south bank beyond Rubicon village, as persistent reports were rumored that the Chinese were on the verge of withdrawing from the entire Shanghai Peninsula.

Small Attendance At Volunteer Meeting

The first regular monthly meeting of the Nome Volunteer Fire Department convened last evening at 8 p.m. and proceeded to regular order of business. A number of citizens were present in reply to the invitation broadcast during the past three days, to the public, to attend.

Reports of committees were heard, including the Benefit Dance committee, which declared it was working out plans for entertainment and the staging of a big affair, the night before Thanksgiving Day. Admission tickets had been printed and were distributed to all members who are to proceed with the work of seeing that everyone in town gets a chance to purchase at least one.

The report of the committee on an all-night telephone service was submitted and discussion took place concerning it.

It was learned that for the monthly payment of \$100, an extra telephone operator would be put on the by Alaska Tel. and Tel. 250 Known Dead Many Injured In Wed.'s Raid

WAS WORST ATTACK OF CIVIL WARFARE

ANOTHER AERIAL ATTACK IS
MADE ON CATALANIAN
CITY—80 DEAD

MADRID, Nov. 4, (AP) — A checkup on those killed and injured in yesterday's air raid revealed that 250 were killed and more than 700 injured.

MADRID, Nov. 4, — An official announcement today placed the toll of yesterday's air bombing of Lerida, at two hundred and fifty dead and more than seven hundred injured.

Another Attack Made

A similar attack was made today on Barbastro, another Catalan city, which reported eighty killed.

The two attacks were ranked by a Madrid newspaper as among the worst attacks on government territory since the beginning of the civil war.

Three persons were killed in Madrid today by one shell, and a dozen injured during a prolonged insurgent shelling of the city.

A New Volcanic Island Is Found Aleutian Chain

SEATTLE, Nov. 4 (AP) — Discovery of another live volcano on the Aleutian Islands is believed to have been made by the Office of Indian Affairs vessel Boxer, which wirelessly witnessed an eruption yesterday.

SEATTLE, Nov. 4, — The U. S. Weather Bureau here said this morning it had received a radiogram from the Office of Indian Affairs ship "Boxer", describing a violent volcanic eruption on Yunaska Island, in the Aleutian chain, west of Unalaska Island.

Passed Nearby

The Boxer passed fifteen miles to the northwest of Yunaska Island the message said.

The eruption covered the entire island with flames. The disturbance was most violent in the center of the island diminishing at the East and West ends.

Yunaska Island is believed to be unpopulated, as it has no source of fresh water.
