

A New Volcanic **Island Is Found** Aleutian Chain

SEATTLE, Nov. 4 (AP) -Discovery of another live volcano on the Aleutian Islands is believed to have been made by the Office of Indian Affairs vessel Boxer, which wirelessed witnessing an eruption yesterday.

SEATTLE, Nov. 4. - The U. S. Weather Bureau here said this morning it had received a radiogram from the Office of Indian Affairs ship "Boxer", describing a violent volcanic eruption on Yunaska Island, in the Aleutian chain, west of Unalaska Island.

Passed Nearby

The Boxer passed fifteen miles to the northwest of Yunaska Isand the message said.

The eruption covered the entire island with flames. The disturbance was most violent in the center of the island diminishing at the East and West ends.

Yunaska Island si believed to be unpopulated, as it has no sour ce of fresh water.
