WATER FRANCHISE PASSED.

Quarter Continues Until Skaguay is An Incorporated City—Then May be Amended—Its Provisions.

The Council met last evening in regular weekly session and passed the water franchise. Secretary Lewis was not present at the meeting, still as the provisions of the bill had been fully agreed to in conference his presence was not necessary. The bill as it passed provides that the franchise shall continue in force until the town shall have been regularly incorporated under Federal law, and until a town government shall be elected under it. Then such town government shall have power to amend the franchise in any reasonable manner. In the meantime the city shall pay to the water company \$25 per month for water for fire service. The council has the right to locate the pipes. The company agrees to maintain the system in good order for the supply of a sufficient quantity of water to serve the city at all times.

After the council had agreed to the terms of the franchise, in conference with Mr. Lewis, that gentleman said it was the intention of the company to present to the city a receipted bill for the first years fire water. The new bill will become a law as soon as it is signed, accepted and published.
