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GOD HELP ALASKA

To the people of Alaska it will not seem strange that those who are pressing the candidacy of Gov. Brady for re-appointment should represent by inference that honesty is a scarce article in this district. It has been the habit of the governor to malign Alaska and it is in keeping with the eternal fitness of things that his supporters should speak deprecatingly of the people over which they would install him as chief executive in perpetuity.

It will seem strange, however, to hear that anyone had urged that Gov. Brady is an "intelligent and progressive advocate of the best things for the territory." If Gov. Brady has ever stood for progress in Alaska, the people of this district have no knowledge of the fact. He has fought with all of his stubborn nature every proposition for advancement that has been proposed for the district. He opposed with all the bitterness of which he is capable the movement in 1899, which resulted in a convention through which the people of the district could express themselves. He opposed the plan to have a delegate to congress, until the indignation meetings taught him that his position was in jeopardy. He has characterized the sturdy prospectors, miners, and business men, who are making Alaska a white man's country, as adventurers who are preying upon the Indians, and when he announced his conversion to the proposition for a delegate in congress, he did so on condition that the Indians could vote, so as to protect themselves against the white men of the district. Still later, in order that he could make a point against the accomplishment of the hope of the people for self-government, he has asserted that the district is retrograding.

If his record shall commend Gov. Brady to President Roosevelt as that of an "intelligent and progressive advocate of the best things for the territory," then God help the territory—there is help in sight from no other source.

SUMMONS FOR PUBLICATION

In the United States District Court, for the District of Alaska, Division No. 1, Nettle E. Mix, complainant, vs. S. Wallace Mix defendant.
To S. Wallace Mix, defendant: Greeting: In the name of the United States of America, you are hereby commanded to be and appear in the above entitled court, holden at Skagway in said division of said district, and answer the complaint filed against you in the above entitled action within thirty days from the date of the service of this summons and a copy of the said complaint upon you, and if you fail so to appear and answer, for want thereof, the plaintiff will apply to the court for the relief demanded in said complaint, a copy of which is served herewith.

This action is brought for the dissolution of the bonds of matrimony now existing between plaintiff and defendant.
The ground alleged is for habitual drunkenness for more than three years last passed.
