## RUSSIANS WILL FIGHT WHEN AWAY FROM COAST

Czar's Generals Will Not Give Japanese Until the Latter Reach the Interior Out of Reach of Ships

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Tinstin, April 20.—Russian officials have given out the statement that a part of Russia's plans are to draw the Japanese armies into the interior of Manchuria before giving fight. They say that to fight the Japanese on the coast where they would have the advantage of communicating with their base of supplies would give that nation the best of the argument and it is not a part of the Russian plans to do that. Once in the interior the two armies would be on an equal footing, as far as aid by sea is concerned, while the Russian forces would have the benefit of an established railway to the rear.

**Vladivostok Is in Want**  
St. Petersburg, April 20.—The population of Vladivostok is in want of the necessities of life. Many are leaving the city, abandoning their homes and property, which they are unable to sell. Half of the city's houses are empty.

**Japanese in Complete Control**  
Shanghai, April 20.—Authorized advices from Seoul declare the Japanese

are in complete control of Korea, and the last Russian scouting parties have retired across the Yalu before the Japanese, who have occupied Wiju without resistance. The Japanese army is divided into two forces, one for expeditionary purposes and the other for occupation.

**Fighting Along Yalu**  
Liao-kang, April 20.—A number of unimportant skirmishes are reported along the Yalu river. Six Japanese soldiers were killed by Russian scouts Saturday.

**Chinese Want to Fight**  
Shanghai, April 20.—Gen. Ma Yu, commander of the Chinese army on the Manchurian border, reports that Russian troops are moving west of Liao river, and he says it is difficult to control his troops. The men are anxious to attack the Russians.

**No News of Transports**  
St. Petersburg, April 20.—No confirmation has been received here of the arrival of a big fleet of Japanese transports on the gulf of Pe-chi-li.

## MUST DIG STRIKING COAL MINERS MAKE TROUBLE

Missionary Must Restore Fortune to Church

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Chicago, April 20.—The Evangelical Lutheran church arbitration board has ordered Rev. P. H. Anderson, missionary in Alaska, to restore to the church \$232,000, which it is alleged was taken from a mine developed with church funds while Anderson was in the ministry. The church also claims the White Star Mining Company, of Alaska, owes it \$20,000 in the same connection. A legal arbitration recently held against Anderson and in favor of the church in this same matter.

Pennsylvania Town In Hands of Armed Mob and Hostilities Are Expected to Break Out Any Minute

surrounded the works of the coal company and an outbreak is momentarily expected between the strikers and the miners in the company's barracks. The sheriff has organized a posse and gone to the scene of the trouble.

## PARKER GETS NEW YORK

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] New York, April 20.—The democratic state convention which completed its labors last night, instructed the delegation from the Empire state to the national convention to support Judge Alton B. Parker, for the democratic presidential nomination. There was no fight over the matter at all. The convention was harmonious, each of the three factions being represented on the delegation.

The action of the democratic convention at Albany is believed to practically insure the nomination of Judge Parker by the democrats. It is believed that he will receive the support of all the conservative democrats in the country, aside from a few votes in the New England states, which will be given to Richard Olney on the first ballot. All factions of the New York democratic party, including Tammany, are pleased with the result of the state convention.
