JAPS LOSE HOT FIGHT

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.]

St. Petersburg, April, 23—The news comes from the front that 1500 Japanese have been defeated in a severe engagement by the Russians. The battle is said to have been fought yesterday on the banks of the Yalu river. The report says the troops of both countries behaved well. The government has received no official confirmation of report.

Russian reconnaissance shows the Japanese to be concentrated in considerable force on the Yalu river. They are also beginning to concentrate a large force at Wiju.

There have been several conflicts between scouting parties of Russians and Japanese during the last few days.

RUSSIAN MINES CAUSE MORE TROUBLE

St. Petersburg, April 23—Viceroy Alexieff reports that yesterday, while launches were engaged in placing mines, one of them was prematurely exploded. A lieutenant and 20 men were killed.

RUSSIAN BALTIC FLEET THREATENED

Stockholm, April 23—It is reported here from responsible quarters that a strange craft, said to be a Japanese submarine boat, is hovering around the east coast of Sweden. It is reported that the Russians are alarmed for the safety of the Baltic fleet.

ARCTIC BROTHERS INVADE TOWN OF HAINES

The spirit of fraternal friendship reigned supreme last night at the launching of Camp Haines No. 17 of the Arctic Brotherhood. The baby camp starts off under auspicious circumstances with twenty charter members, and it is said there will be at least thirty members within a week. The institution of the camp was followed by sumptuous banquet at the Northern hotel, at which the unity of the Lynn canal towns of Skagway and Haines and the success of the Arctic Brotherhood was toasted.

There were twenty-two members of Camp Skagway No. 1, the mother camp of the Arctic Brotherhood, present at the institution of Camp Haines. They went down on the Union, that craft making two trips with them yesterday. Among them were several officers of the grand camp.

A. R. Young, Arctic trail guide; J. W. Marti, Arctic trail blazer; B. A. Mahan, Arctic keeper of outer tollgate; James Fay, Arctic keeper of inner tollgate; J. F. Tompkins, John M. Blankenberg, Sol Ripinsky, J. B. Peterson, T. R. Sewell, trustees.

After the initiation of the new members and the installation of the officers, the members of the Skagway and the Haines camps participated in one of the most successful banquets that has ever taken place in the north.

Dr. L. S. Keller, grand Arctic chief, was toastmaster. Probably the most significant speech made was that delivered by the Arctic chief of the new camp, R. M. Odell, who toasted the mother camp and the Skagway spirit, which he said he had admired for many years. He hoped that the people of Haines would absorb the public spirit and the disposition to act in union that marked Skagway, and he gave expression to the sentiment that another tie now binds the two cities on Lynn canal. Happy speeches were also made by Rev. N. B. Harrison, Major W. P. Richardson, Dr. L. S. Keller, H. B. Le Fevre, C. B. Haraden, G. Chealander, W. B. Stout, A. R. Young, J. J. Daly, J. N. Wilcoxon, E. Ruud, T. R. Sewell, John M. Blankenberg and others.

Some of the Skagwayans returned on the Union at 4:30 o'clock this morning and the remainder of the contingent will return on the Peterson this afternoon.
