## JAPAN'S SECOND ARMY GOES TO THE FRONT

Seventy Thousand Men Depart from Chenampo in 83 Ships to Make War Upon the Legions of the Czar

[Special Dispatch to the Daily Alaskan.]

Seoul, May 14.—The second Japanese army, consisting of 70,000 men, left Chenampo on 83 transports yesterday. The soldiers were crowded into the vessels in the closest manner possible. One ship had 3800 aboard.

In spite of the discomforts there was no grumbling by the men.

**Japanese Lose Torpedo Boat**  
Tokio, May 14.—The Japanese torpedo boat No. 49 was destroyed while removing Russian mines at Kerr bay, near Port Dalney, yesterday. Seven were killed and seven wounded. This is the first warship to be lost by the Japanese since the beginning of the war.

**Port Arthur Again Shut Off**  
St. Petersburg, May 14.—Both telegraphic and railway communication with Port Arthur has been cut off.

No further particulars have been received of the blowing up of the docks at Port Dalney.

**American Warship to the Front**  
Shanghai, May 14.—The United States cruiser New Orleans has left for Chifoo. The Chinese in the vicinity of Newchwang are restless, and it is considered advisable to have a warship

ship near when the Russians withdraw from Newchwang.

**News to Them**  
London, May 14.—The American line officers in London know nothing of the rumor originating in Paris that the Russians are seeking to purchase the American liners St. Louis and St. Paul.

**Information Scarce**  
St. Petersburg, May 14.—Much uncertainty exists as to what has occurred at the seat of war. Kuroki's plans are carefully guarded by the Japanese. The general opinion here is that heavy fighting will occur within a fortnight.

Advices indicate the Japanese are pushing the campaign in Southern Manchuria with great energy. The rainy season, which always renders the roads impassable, begins within six weeks, and Japan likely hopes to make her position and to secure a decisive engagement before the rains set in.

**Czar to Bid Army Goodbye**  
St. Petersburg, May 14.—The emperor is arranging to go to Kharkoff, May 23, to bid farewell to the Tenth army corps upon its departure for the east.

## BIG FIRE AT PORTLAND

The Willamette city's sawmill district burns to the ground causing a loss of \$300,000.

Portland, Ore., May 14.—The sawmill district in the southern portion of Portland's waterfront on the west side of the Willamette was visited by one of the worst conflagrations in the history of this city last night.

The fire destroyed the mills of the Day Lumber Co., Ira Powers & Co's mill, the Multnomah trunk and box factory and the Jones Lumber Company's mill. The loss is about \$300,000.
