

RUSSIA SEEKS RELEASE OF BLACK SEA FLEET

Negotiations Being Conducted By St. Petersburg With Constantinople for Permission to Pass Ships Through Dardanelles

St. Petersburg, June 11.—The Associated Press is informed, officially, that negotiations are taking place between Russia and Turkey concerning the passage of the Black sea fleet through the Dardanelles.

Turkey Says No Danger
Constantinople, June 11.—The Turkish government has affirmed positively

its intention of maintaining a strict neutrality in the war with Russia and Japan and to observe the obligations of the Berlin treaty. While diplomatic circles believe in the existence of danger, it is not thought Russia will consider the reduction of the Black sea fleet at present on account of the disturbed conditions in the Balkans.

TWO LAND FOR HEARST KILL WIFE

American Marines Protect Life At Tangier

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Tangier, June 11.—The American consul sent two unarmed marines to the residence of the Countess De Jussaret, formerly Miss Story of New York, now the wife of the Belgian minister. The Countess is living in an isolated house. Her husband is absent. The marines were sent as a precautionary measure. These are the only American marines that have landed up to the present time.

Negotiations Progressing
Washington, June 11.—A telegram from United States Consul Gummars at Tangier, states that negotiations for the release of Ion Perdicaris and Varley are progressing. The sultan's reply to Raisulis' demands as to the ransom has not yet reached the bandit leader.

Council Confirms Clayton Permit

Clayton & Co. a permit to extend the show window on the new building that company is having erected at the corner of Broadway and Fourth Avenue over the sidewalk 22 inches. This action was taken after a full discussion of the matter, and because there was no objection raised by any of the property owners of the city. The question as to granting permission to have the foundation of the window rest upon the sidewalk instead of being suspended from the building, came up, but the council refused to act further.

IS DROWNED

Operator at Five Fingers Meets Watery Grave

W. L. Lanktree, the Dominion operator at Five Fingers, was drowned last Wednesday morning in the Yukon river near his station.

The news was received yesterday. The dead operator and his brother, the latter a lineman, were stationed at Five Fingers. For two days, the operators along the line were unable to get a response from that station. Yesterday morning a call was received from there from the lineman, who not being an operator, made himself understood only with great difficulty. In a labored way he conveyed the information that his brother helped him across the river in a boat Wednesday and that in doing so he was drowned.

Lanktree was well known at Whitehorse, where he was employed by the W. P. & Y. R. for two years in 1901 and 1902.

MINERS AND STATE TROOPS CLASH AGAIN

Pitched Battle Fought Between 200 Soldiers and 65 Union Men at Dunnville—Colorado Cities Are Wildly Excited

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Cripple Creek, June 11.—There has been intense excitement here all day due to a battle between the troops and miners at Dunnville last night. Some skirmishing at Big Bull Hill, and the wrecking of the Victor Record office. It is considered remarkable that so few were killed in the Dunnville battle. The forces numbered 200 soldiers under command of Gen. Bell and 65 miners

behind rocks and trees. Only a few were killed.

Denver Thoroughly Aroused
Denver, June 11.—The slaughter of the miners of the Cripple Creek district who are refusing to comply with the order to vacate is arousing the public feeling to the highest pitch. Sentiment for and against the miners is equally divided here, but the tales of shooting constantly arriving are stirring both factions to the highest degree of excitement.

STATE CLOSES UNION MINE

Gen. Bell Orders Portland Mine to Quit Work Because It Favors Strikers

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Victor, Colo., June 11.—Adjutant General Bell has ordered the Portland mine, employing union men, closed down. The order says the Portland

mine for a long time has been engaged in employing and harboring large numbers of dangerous and lawless men, who have ordered and encouraged those who have been guilty of crimes and outrage. The Portland mine employs 500 men.

Bob Wright Is Dead
