### NEW ONE NO CHANGE

P. E. Kern Will Begin New Building Construction Committee to Manage Water System

The city council, which was in regular session last night, decided to permit the select committee that has had charge of the construction of the municipal water system to retain charge of the operation of the plant until the mayor shall appoint the regular water system committee that is provided for in the water ordinance. The council also manifested a determination to consolidate the offices of water supervisor, fire warden and street commissioner. Applications for the position of fire warden and street commissioner from W. M. Leslie, Joe Boxley and Otto Glaw were referred to the select committee. The applications of Boxley and Glaw were filed last night and were accompanied by petitions of endorsement from citizens of the town. It was stated there would be other applications. The select committee, which has charge of the water system, consists of J. R. Van Cleave, W. W. Foughton and F. Woland.

Seattle, Dec. 6.—The Steamer Corwin, formerly a United States revenue marine cutter, will go on the Seattle-Valdez route. She will leave this city in two weeks with a cargo of dynamite and other explosives.

### RUSSIANS ADMIT FIRING ON OWN SHIPS

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] St. Petersburg, Dec. 6.—Admiral Rozhkovsky admits now that the Hull disaster was the result of an engagement between the Russian ships. The big battleships were firing at the smaller boats of their own fleet. The captain and one petty officer on the Aurora were killed from the shots of the Russian fleet.

**Japs Object to Aid to Baltic Fleet**  
Tokyo, Dec. 6.—Japan has made strong objections to the aid citizens of neutral powers are rendering the Russian Baltic fleet in its efforts to reach the Orient.

Mukden, Dec. 6.—The Japanese attempted to mine the Shakhe river bridges Saturday. They were discovered by the Russians, and a sharp fight took place.

### JAMES N. TYNER PASSES AWAY

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] Washington, Dec. 6.—James N. Tyner, who was sixth assistant attorney general in charge of the legal branch of the postoffice department, and who was indicted last year in connection with the postoffice frauds, died here this morning. The indictments against Tyner were dismissed, but the executive refused to permit the records in the department to show that he had been exonerated. It was held that the indictments were dismissed through technicalities.
