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IT LOOKS LIKE CONGDON

There seems little reason to doubt but that Ex-Gov. Congdon will be successful in the parliamentary contest that is now in full swing in the Yukon, and there has not been offered up to the present time any good reason why the people should not be satisfied with the prospect. The liberal party is in full possession of the government of Canada and it has the entire confidence of the Canadian people. The government of the Yukon will continue in the hands of the Laurier administration no matter what the result of the election. Mr. Congdon would, therefore, be in position to do more for his district than Dr. Thompson could possibly do. So far as the people of this end of his district can discover he has been an earnest laborer in the efforts to develop the country. Since the beginning of his administration the Treadwell and other concessions of which the people complained so bitterly have been annulled in all cases where the government could take that action. So many of the things which the people complained of have been remedied in the last two years that many of the issues of the last campaign have not been heard of in this.

It will not be contended, probably, by anyone that the administration of the Yukon is perfect. There is no doubt much room for improvement. It would be strange were it otherwise. The question for the people in this election is how to use the ballot so they can make the greatest headway toward better government. The constant improvement of the last two years and the fact that the liberal government will be in power anyhow seem to leave but one answer to this problem and that is, by voting for Mr. Congdon.

The city government is fast wiping out the indebtedness contracted on account of the municipal water system. There is now only \$600 owing on the excellent plant which cost the city about \$18,000. By the time the next year is half completed the entire indebtedness will have been wiped out.

Pumphrey's Will Passes

A late Fairbanks paper brings the news that T. R. Pumphrey, formerly of this place, is in the hospital at Fairbanks, ill of pneumonia. At the time the paper was issued, it was stated the disease had taken a favorable turn and hope for his recovery was entertained.
