PLATT'S ATTACK INVITED

Those Alaskans who have opposed territorial government for Alaska more than any others are to blame for the efforts of Senator Platt and others to blacklist citizenship in this district. By staving off the recognition of the right of the people to self government, they invited the attack of the powerful coalition of senators which has enlisted in a war to prevent the extension of western influence in the nation.

The Valdes News, commenting upon this phase of the situation, says:

"Those comparatively few people in Alaska who have upheld the administration of Gov. Brady are pointing with pride to the mild impeachment handed out to Senator Platt in the governor's report. Platt was the father of the amendment to the delegate bill to the effect that Alaska should never become a state. The governor arose in his dignity and smote the Connecticut senator and wound up by saying that the amendment would have the effect of 'making Alaska a political inferno, that all who enter are to leave hope behind.' But what else could Gov. Brady do? This Platt amendment was indeed a body blow to him because in the one short sentence all his alleged theories and plans for Alaska's political future were shattered. Brady has opposed every form of local self-government in Alaska on the ground that nothing would satisfy but statehood. He professed to believe that if Alaska was granted a territorial form of government she would be unable to get statehood for many years while if she remained in her present condition for a short while she would be taken in as a state without the usual 'probationary' period. But Platt's amendment leaves the governor without a leg to stand upon and it will be interesting to note what position he takes now."

A. M. Rousseau, for several years manager of the Whitehorse Star, has sold his interest in that paper to E. J. White, the paper's editor and Mr. Rousseau's brother-in-law, and leaves for the south where he probably will remain. Mr. Rousseau was a Skagway pioneer and he leaves a host of friends in the north. His successor in the ownership of the Star, Mr. White, besides being one of the best newspaper men who have come to this great north country, is also a Skagway pioneer.

John L. Sullivan and Charles Mitchell, who were the central stars in the fistie world scores of years ago, have been matched to fight at Tacoma next month. They are old enough to know better and have made enough money in their time, had they cared for it, to make such an exhibition unnecessary. Well, one good thing is the fact that they won't hurt each other. They will probably make a little easy money.

If Dr. Chapman and the other revivalists keep on with that tune they are playing on Seattle sentiment it might serve as a march to mark time as Bill Gill steps from power.
