This silvery laugh is the result of weeks and months of special training and hours and hours of patient practice. Perfection is attained only through private instruction. This laugh is a branch of musical training applied to embellish conversation in the most pleasing manner.

The girl with the loud, hearty laugh is all right in the mountain or seaside resort, but that same laugh is tabooed in the drawing room. She realizes this, and so she goes to a musical trainer and cultivates a merry laugh which is soft and refined and delightful to hear. She can laugh in every known key and in every pitch. The tuning fork is a most necessary adjunct to this practice, although a piano or any musical instrument can be used. It is best, however, to use the old-fashioned tuning fork, says a very successful trainer of the voice.

Ordinance No. 67

An ordinance, providing for the taxing of dogs, and for other purposes.
Be it enacted by the common council of the town of Skagway:

Section 1. That no dog over the age of three months, shall be permitted to run at large in any of the streets, squares, lanes or alleys, or in other public places in the town of Skagway, Alaska, unless a tax of two dollars (\$2.00), shall have first been paid to the town treasurer, for said dog, by the owner or custodian thereof.

Section 2. That the owner or the person having in charge any dog, which he allows or permits to run at large within the limits of the town of Skagway, shall pay the town treasurer the sum of two dollars (\$2.00) for each and every such dog, which payment shall entitle him to a receipt from the treasurer, designating the owner's name and the number of the license and the year or years for which such license is issued.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the owner or person having in charge any dog, before he shall allow it to run at large, to place on such dog's neck a collar of metal or leather, to which is attached the stamped metal tag, issued by the town treasurer.

Section 4. That the annual time for the issuance of the license herein provided for, and the time when all such licenses shall expire, shall be the first of September of each year. The license or tax herein provided for, shall be deemed a permit for the dog, for which it is issued, with the exception as provided in section six of this ordinance, to run at large from the date of its issuance until the first of the following September; provided further, that such dog shall have upon its neck, a collar, to which is attached the stamped metal tag before described.

Section 5. That no dog license shall be issued for a longer or shorter period than to the first of September, following the date of its issuance.

Section 6. That no slut or female dog in time of heat, no habitually vicious dog, or mad dog, shall be permitted to run at large within the town limits. And it shall be lawful for any person to kill any such dog found running at large whether the tax on such dog has been paid or not.

Section 7. It shall be a misdemeanor for any person, the owner of or having in charge any such dog, as described in the last preceding section, to permit the same to run at large in the town of Skagway; any such person, who shall knowingly or willfully permit such dog to run at large, shall, upon conviction thereof before the municipal magistrate be adjudged guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine of not less than five dollars (\$5.00) or more than twenty-five dollars (\$25.00).

Section 8. The town treasurer shall keep a record of the licenses issued un-

der the provisions of this ordinance and shall, on the fifth day of September of each year and at such other times as the chief of police shall require it issue to such officer a list of the persons who have paid a dog tax and the number of their license.

Section 9. It shall be the duty of the chief of police to kill or cause to be killed all dogs, found running at large within the town of Skagway, without a collar, to which is attached the stamped metal tag issued by the town treasurer, as above provided. The chief of police shall cause all dogs, so killed, to be buried or otherwise disposed of, in such place as the town health officer may direct.

Section 10. That ordinances twenty-nine (29), forty-four (44), and fifty-one (51) of the town of Skagway and the whole thereof be and the same are hereby repealed.

Section 11. That this ordinance shall be in force on and after the date of its passage.
Introduced March 13th, 1905.

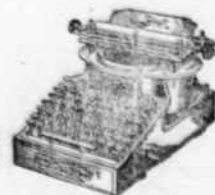
