



## Nome Is Swept By Fire

Seward peninsula metropolis visited by conflagration which destroys 30 buildings on Division street--Loss is over \$300,000

Nome, Sep. 19--The worst fire in the history of this place swept 30 building out of existence this morning. The conflagration extended from Lane's way to the Staple building on Division street, making a clean sweep.

The losses on account of the fire are estimated at \$300,000.

## TRIAL IS ON

Commander of Bennington Before Court Martial

[Special Dispatch to Daily Alaskan.] San Francisco, Sept. 19--The trial by court martial of Commander Lucien Young, who was in command of the Bennington at the time of the explosion in San Diego harbor, begun at Mare Island this morning.

The logs of the ship for the first six months of this year were placed in evidence by the prosecution. They had not been signed by Capt. Young. This was offered to show negligence on the part of the commanding officer.

Witnesses today are reviewing the condition of the vessel at the time of the accident and the general conduct of Capt. Young.

## Envoys Will Meet Again

Czar requests another peace conference which will convene at the Hague--President Roosevelt accedes to the request

St. Petersburg, Sep. 19--The czar has issued a call for a second peace conference between representatives of Russia and Japan to meet at The Hague, and advices have been received here that President Roosevelt has acceded to the request. It is not known how the call will be conveyed to Japan. No date for the beginning of the conference has been set.

The call created great surprise in official circles here. There is much speculation as to the causes for the call and as to how the meeting will be consummated.

Conrad City Expresses Appreciation of Councilman

Conrad City, Sept. 16--A mass meeting of the prospectors and miners of Conrad City held Friday evening for the purpose of showing their appreciation of the work accomplished for this camp by Robert Lowe, was highly enthusiastic from beginning to finish. Several speeches were made by highly pleased prospectors, miners and mine operators, showing in detail the immediate benefits derived for the young camp through the tireless efforts and work of Mr. Lowe in the Yukon council.

Conrad, the financial man of the camp, in a happy strain, among other interesting statements, said that development work on the Bonanza group would have been suspended for the season had it not been for the roads built and other timely assistance rendered by the Yukon government.
