The City Dock

Since the recent additions to the City Dock, the business of that institution is increasing rapidly with every reason to hope that the future revenues will more than justify the outlay.

During the month of August, four boats made a total of seven landings at the dock; bringing 79 tons of coal and 128 tons of merchandise; and taking 16 tons of merchandise. The wharfage, dockage and profit on coal amounted to \$173.25. The expense, for longshoring \$10, salary of wharfinger, 26 days at \$3, \$78.00. Total expense \$88.00.

During the month of September, ten boats made a total of eighteen landings leaving 235 1-5 tons of merchandise and taking 25 tons. The receipts for wharfage and dockage—no coal sold—were \$185.75. Expenses, longshoring \$12.25; salary of wharfinger 28 1/2 days, \$85.50. Total expenses \$97.75. Net returns for two months, \$173.25.

The steamship Northland landed 75 tons of Ladysmith coal at the dock Saturday night. 500 tons more of this splendid coal has been ordered and should arrive within the week. The plan of the new bankers—dumping the coal through large openings in the roof without the intervention of hoppers and cars—works fine, and saves expense.
