MUSHING TO NOME

Recent Dawson Arrival Estimates Having Not 200 Argonauts.

H. Wheeler and Thomas Milton were the arrivals from Dawson evening before last. They left there November 23d. Milton, who is a St. Paul business man, said at the Mondamin yesterday:

"We met 200 men mushing in who said they were bound for Nome. They were scattered all along the route, the greater number of them being met toward this end of our journey. Not more than ten per cent of them had dog teams. In other cases the men pushed and pulled sleds along, usually one man ahead with a rope and one behind pushing. We spoke only a moment to them as we passed, and when we cried out, saying: 'Are you for Nome?' or 'Bound for Nome, are you not?' the answer almost always was 'Yes,' or 'You bet.'"

"There are probably 200 scows blockaded along the river. Fifty-six are at Scow Island, near Stewart, alone, and take every inch of landing space about the little island. At Thistle and Tulare we saw many taking in supplies from the scows."

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BABCOCK'S TROUBLES

Hamlin Garland's Partner Had a Hard Late Trip.

Burton Babcock, mining partner of Hamlin Garland the well-known author, writes that he had a pretty long trip to Dawson. He left Bennett, with the six barges towed by the tug Lindeman sent out from there on October 11th by Spencer & Seelye, and did not reach Dawson until November 14th. The bad time began at Windy Arm, where one barge was crushed and two men on her narrowly escaped.

The little steamer sank while going through the canyon below White Horse, and Mr. Babcock and the other men on her climbed on the roof of the deck house and held on there as best they could until one of the mounted police came down in a row boat and took them off. The rest of the barges, much battered and leaky, finally were caught in the ice jam six miles above Stewart river, and from there the party pushed on with sleds. A Mr. Clark, with his wife and two children were of the party, and to them the whole trip must have been a succession of thrilling experiences long to be remembered.

The steamer Farallon is expected to arrive tomorrow. This will be one day ahead of her scheduled time. Late advice received by Agent Dautrick says she was to have gotten away from the Sound earlier than at first planned.
