New Order Does Not Reduce the Pay.

The article in the Daily Alaskan which stated that there had been a cut in the pay of privates in the hospital corps, was written under a misapprehension of the real facts and consequently misleading. Under the new order, the privates in the hospital corps have been placed in two classes, first-class privates and privates. The former get \$18 and the latter \$16 per month. None of those stationed at Skagway will come under the inferior designation.

The order also changes the titles of the officers in the corps. Hospital stewards become first-class sergeants, and acting hospital stewards, sergeants. In addition, the rank of corporal has been created. The lowest rank, or plain private, will only apply to those here after enlisted.
