CHARACTERISTIC NONSENSE

It is a peculiar thing that every paper in Alaska that favors territorial government is edited by a man who never saw the great interior of Alaska, and everyone who has seen Alaska and traveled over it as the senatorial committee did, are opposed to it.—Valdez Prospector.

The Prospector's statement is characteristic of the monarchistic press of Alaska in that it is without foundation in fact. It is not true that none of the editors of papers which are favoring territorial government for this district have ever been in the Alaskan interior, but it would have no bearing on the question if it were true. The fact that the thousands who live in the great interior country are themselves favorable to territorial government is indicative of what the conditions of that section require.

Haines the Center of Social Activity

Haines, Jan. 28.—That Haines has taken its place among the thriving permanent towns that dot the coast of Southeastern Alaska, could not be better shown than by the social activity that pre-rolls here this winter.

Among the institutions of this place which is a center of social doings is the Haines Athletic Club, recently organized with Chief Clerk Kane, of the construction quartermaster's department, as president; James Fay, secretary, and R. M. Odell, treasurer. Capt. L. F. Tompkins has been selected as physical instructor. The club starts with 50 members.

The Haines Social Club is another institution which is doing much to make life interesting in the future big military town of Alaska. It meets bi-weekly, and the programs are varied. Games, readings, debates, extempore speeches, discussions, recitations and music, are features of the entertainments.

A whist club was organized this week, and the first meeting was held at the home of Mrs. E. A. LeWold, Wednesday. Mrs. Blankenburg and Mrs. Young won the prizes. The next meeting will be held next Wednesday, at the home of Mrs. Henry Brie.

A snowshoeing and toboggan club was contemplated, but the difficulty experienced in getting skoes and snowshoes sufficiently early in the season induced a postponement of the organization until next winter.

A mountain climbing club is contemplated for next summer.

One of the sources of great amusement at Haines this winter is the Native Social Club. It is composed exclusively of Indians and meets every Monday night. The programs consist of masquerades, Indian games, imitation potlaches and minstrel entertainments. They are enjoyed hugely by the white people, who contribute 15 cents each as an admission fee to each of the performances. Louis Shortridge, son of the Chilkat chief, is president of the club.

MAN KILLED

Adam Goldworthy Burned to Death

Adam Goldworthy, a Henderson creek miner, was burned to death in the Reindeer roadhouse, near Dawson, about two weeks ago. The discovery of the tragedy resulted from the report of teamsters, who, in passing the site of the roadhouse, found it had been reduced to a lot of smoking embers. An unroofed and unblanketed horse stood shivering in the barn, showing it had been left longer than intended by its master.

The teamsters reported the details of their find to the police at Indian river crossing. Constable Gervaise was immediately detailed from that post to make an investigation of the theory that someone had been burned to death in the fire.

By the time the constable reached the scene the ashes were cold, and he had no difficulty in searching them. He had not proceeded far with the work when he came across the charred corpse of Goldworthy.
