The military aid to Turkey is defensive. How effective it will be only time will tell.

The military aid to Greece is all important, because the Russians have an army in the field in Greece today. It is an army of guerrillas raiders, bandits and mercenaries, a Communist army that raids farms, burns villages, kills citizens, steals food, disrupts industry, and prevents establishment of peace, order and security. Until that guerrilla army is beaten off, Greece cannot be internally at peace, and until it is it cannot produce what its people need to enjoy their rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness.

Digging down to the bottom of his 400-million-dollar package, John Smith looks to see whether American oil imperialism is wrapped up in it somewhere. He has heard that it is. Will he find it?

He will find that Americans have invested very large sums of money in the discovery, development and exploitation of oil in the middle east. He will easily discover that Russia covets that oil. Americans bought that oil. They

did not steal it. They have not invaded the political, economic or social rights of the people in those oil countries. So far as Americans are concerned, they do not want to invade or curtail or take away any of the rights of those people. To do that would be imperialism. To develop oil, pay rolls and prosperity in those countries—which is what Americans are doing—is not imperialism; it is good business for those people as well as for us. And John Smith should not overlook the most important fact that the oil the Russians covet there may be vital to our safety if ever again we get into a shooting war.

Harry and John hope this 400-million-dollar purchase is going to help buy security, peace and human liberty. If it buys these things over there, it will help bulwark them here against the threat of Communist subversion of the liberties of individual Americans like Harry and John.

**FIRST WORLD WAR INSURANCE EXTENDED**

Recent legislation provides that World War I veterans may extend their United States Government Life Insurance for another five-year term, the Veterans Administration announces.

Applications for renewal must be made before the expiration of the present term, the VA cautions. Premiums will be based on the present age of the veteran and no medical examination will be required.

Vetereans may apply at their local VA contact office for application forms and assistance in preparing them.

Information as to a particular USGLI policy status may be obtained from the VA's central office, Washington, D. C. Insurance files for World War I veterans have not been decentralized to the branch offices which handle National Service Life Insurance issued to World War II veterans.

**ANGEL PIE**

- 1 recipe for 9 inch pastry shell
- 4 egg yolks
- ¼ teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 1 teaspoon grated orange rind
- ½ cup sugar
- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
- 4 egg whites, beaten stiff
- 4 tablespoons confectioners' sugar

Prepare pie shell, bake and cool. Beat egg yolks. Add sugar, salt, orange juice and rinds. Place over hot water. Cook until thick, stirring constantly. Cool. Place in pie shell. Chill in refrigerator at least eight hours. Beat the egg whites stiff with the confectioners' sugar. Spread in a high meringue over the icy-cold pie. Pop instantly into 450° oven to brown. Serve at once.

**EGGS ALIBI**

- 8 eggs
- 3 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup catsup
- 1 cup chili sauce
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 2 teaspoons vinegar, garlic flavored if possible.
- ½ cup water
- ½ teaspoon sugar

Melt butter in saucepan. Add catsup, chili sauce and Worcestershire sauce and simmer three minutes. Mix together mustard, vinegar and sugar and add to mixture in saucepan. Add water. Break each egg into saucer and carefully slip into pan. Put top on pan and simmer for 15 minutes.
