The members of the Arctic Native Brotherhood after sincere consideration of native problems that occur on different occasions decided to acquaint you with the Equal Rights Bill, which many people are using as a tool in arguments against native problems.

Laws of Alaska 1945

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the Territory of Alaska:

Section 1. All citizens within the jurisdiction of the Territory of Alaska shall be entitled to the full and equal enjoyment of accommodations, advantages, facilities and privileges of public inns, restaurants, eating houses, hotels, soda fountains, soft drink parlors, taverns, roadhouses, barber shops, beauty parlors, bathrooms, rest-houses, theaters, skating rinks, cafes, ice cream parlors, transportation companies, and all other conveyances and amusements subject only to the conditions and limitations established by law and applicable alike to all citizens.

Approved February 16, 1945.

Argentina Gives Unacceptable Amendment

QUITANDINHA, Brazil, (P)—A surprise Argentine amendment to hemisphere defense measures was raised today in what had promised to be a perfunctory session of the inter-American conference committee on aggression.

Sen. Vandenberg (R-Mich.), U. S. delegate, charged that the Argentine move was "an attempt to limit even the right to consult" on aggression. He said the amendment proposed "a limitation we can never accept."

The committee assembled to study the draft report on the inter-American zone of maritime security, drawn up by delegates of the United States, Argentina and Chile. It had been expected to approve quickly the outline of a security zone stretching from pole to pole and from Greenland to the Aleutians.
