## Liberty Launch Sinks; 15 Drown

HYERES, France (AP)—A liberty launch carrying a party of U. S. sailors from the Riviera to the Carrier Midway was swamped yesterday, and French sources said up to 15 men were reported drowned.

(The French press agency said 15 bodies had been recovered.

(In London, the U. S. navy said eight men were "unaccounted for" in figures still subject to revision).

The accident occurred as the sailors were returning from a Riviera party to their ship, anchored near one of the Hyeres Islands off the southern coast of France, midway between Marseille and Cannes. Heyeres is 10 miles east of Toulon.

The Midway, which the United States has maintained in the Mediterranean for several months, was paying a courtesy call to the French Riviera.

The navy department in Washington announced last month that the Midway was to be withdrawn from Mediterranean duty about March 15 and replaced by the 27,000-ton carrier Philippine Sea. The Midway, the announcement said, is to undergo extensive alterations, including strengthening of their flight deck to accommodate heavier planes.

It was from the Midway last September that a 15-ton V-2 rocket was fired—the first such launching from aboard a ship.

SEATTLE (AP)—Fairbanks, bustling city in the "golden heart of Alaska," will see a bigger tourist boom this summer than ever before.

Frank B. Camp, veteran Alaska newspaperman, advertising manager of Jessen's Weekly at Fairbanks, believes.

"I'll admit that it takes money to get started," Campbell said yesterday, "but I still say Alaska offers a greater opportunity to a young man now than ever before in its history.

"The tourist trade is just an example—you could mention almost any kind of business—but it's a good example. Why, already, a single airline is preparing to fly 10,000 tourists from Great Falls, Mont., to Fairbanks this summer.

"There'll be thousands of others coming by auto."

## AMERICAN LEGION REPORTS GOOD MEETING

The American Legion reports a splendid attendance at their meeting on Monday evening with legionnaires Godsbe, Kammerer, and Ullrich in charge of the refreshments.

A resolution was passed by the Legion requesting the City to take steps for a "strict adherence to and the enforcement of regulations set up by the Territorial Board of Liquor Control" and formulation of additional City Ordinances to cope with the liquor situation in Nome.

The resolution also asks that the Nome City Council should indicate to the licensed retail liquor establishments involved "that if existing conditions do not improve, an enraged citizenry may resort to petitioning the Territorial Board of Liquor Control for a referendum to vote on local option."

It is stated in the resolution that the action was deemed necessary when it was learned that Columbia Broadcasting Co. made recordings last week on the subject, for possible nation-wide broadcasting.
