## What's Cooking?

### BOSTON BROWN BREAD

1/2 cup rye meal  
1/2 cup corn meal  
1 teaspoon soda  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup coarse entire wheat flour, unsifted  
1/3 cup molasses  
1 cup sour milk or 7/8 cup of sweet milk or water

Sift the rye meal, cornmeal soda and salt. Add the unsifted wheat flour, molasses and sour milk or sweet milk or water. Stir until well mixed. Turn into greased muffin tins or individual molds. Cover closely. Place on trivet in kettle of boiling water. Cover and steam two and one-half to three hours. Keep water boiling gently and replenish as needed.

### MIXED VEGETABLE SLAW

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon paprika  
1/4 teaspoon dry mustard  
1 teaspoon sugar  
1/4 lemon juice  
1/4 cup salad oil  
3 cups finely shredded cabbage  
1 cup shredded carrots  
1 cup diced celery  
2 teaspoons finely grated onion  
1/4 cup finely cut green pepper  
Mix salt, paprika, mustard, sugar and lemon juice together in a large salad bowl. Beat in salad oil with a spoon or fork. Add vegetables and mix thoroughly. If salad is not to be served immediately, chill. Serves six.

## Alaskan To Greet Christmas Ship In Bremen

When Europe's Christmas relief ship docks at Bremen, a representative from Alaska may be on the dock to greet her.

Present plans are that eight (it may be cut to 4) leaders from the great Pacific Northwest will be flown to Bremen to welcome the ship they loaded with food and clothing, and then will spend two months in Europe to see the situation for themselves.

3. There is no assurance the proposed revision of the coastal shipping laws would give better Alaska service, and because of the lack of obligation of foreign companies to serve any but the most profitable routes, poorer service might result.

4. Alaska's service can be adequately fulfilled by American shipping.

Companies which served well during the war should not be abandoned in peace.

6. American companies should be encouraged to return service to the compensatory basis which existed prior to wartime government operation of the lines.
