## Hydrogen Bomb Talk Is Like A "Cloud Of Words"

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. (AP)—David E. Lilienthal says talk about the hydrogen bomb is like a "cloud of words" that followed the explosion of the first atom bomb

He told about 10,000 educators last night that after the atom bombs were dropped on Hiroshima and Nagasaki there followed "the greatest verbal detonation in history, a mushroom-shaped cloud of words, 40,000 feet in altitude, purple in color."

Lilienthal, former chairman of the atomic energy commission, said "This is being duplicated in the past few weeks."

At a news conference preceding his address, Lilienthal was asked to comment on a statement by Dr. Leo Szilard, one of the nation's top atomic scientists, that the hydrogen bomb could kill all humans in the world.

"I won't have anything on that today," Lilienthal said.

But, in his extemporaneous remarks to the American Association of School Administrators annual convention, Lilienthal said:

"We should have faith that our Creator did not endow men with the knowledge to unlock the atom with the idea that he would destroy himself"

## Truman May Let Senate Committee See Secret Files

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Truman may surprise his GOP critics by opening secret state department files to communist-hunting Senators.

An administration official who declined to be quoted by name said today the President might decide to permit representatives of a Senate foreign relations subcommittee to delve into the records in its inquiry—beginning next Wednesday—into charges by Senator McCarthy (R.-Wis.)

McCarthy has said that a number of communists are now working or have worked for the state department. He has contended, however, that an investigation of these charges would be useless unless their secret loyalty files are made available.

Mr. Truman has banned Congressional committees from the files in the past. Administration lieutenants said he may make an exception to allow Senators to visit the state department and see the files there.

If that happens, Republicans said they will demand that one or more of their members be present when the files are examined.

A Senate appropriations subcommittee heard testimony by state department officials yesterday that hundreds of representatives of other executive agencies have thumbed through the loyalty files to learn whether job applicants have any black marks on this records.

## Petersburg Press Publisher Injured By Clay Pigeon

SEATTLE, (AP) — Accidentally struck in the right eye by a "clay pigeon," William Wilder of Petersburg, Alaska, was flown here by Pan American Airways Monday night for possible surgery.

Wilder, 24, is publisher of the Petersburg Press. Sunday afternoon he was standing in front of a skeet trap at a range being opened in the Alaska city. Someone accidentally tripped the trigger. Wilder, only a foot distance, was hit by the clay disc. Fragments of his glasses were driven into his eye.

He was taken here to the Cobb Building Clinic, where doctors immediately began attempting to save the injured eye.

His father, C. A. Wilder, in charge of the mechanical department of the Las Cruces (N.M.) Sun-News, arrived here at noon by air from El Paso, Tex.

The father was to fly to Petersburg yesterday to resume publication of the weekly until his son can return. Wilder and his wife, Ethel, operated the paper for seven years before turning it over to their son after the war. She is now society editor of the Las Cruces Sun-News.
