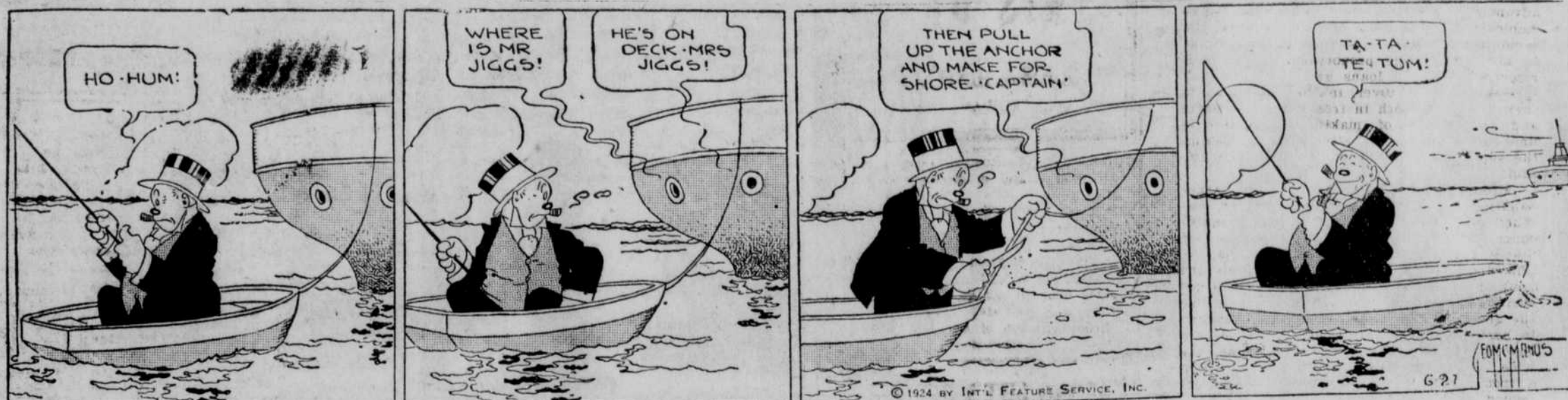

Second Inning

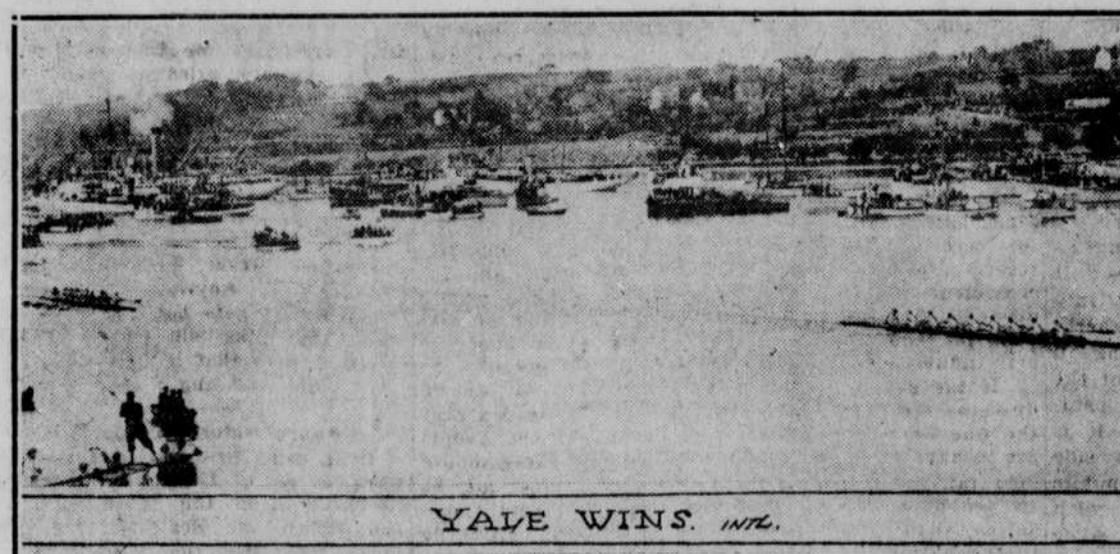

Smith struck out. Neimi walked. Manning struck out. Barragar struck out. O'Neill struck out. Davis struck

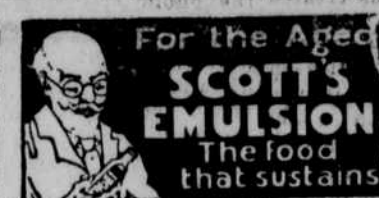
YALE VARSITY CREW DEFEATS HARVARD.
