MANILA, June 30.—Dr. A. Alfageme, acting superior of the Dominican Corporation of the Philippines and former President of the University of Santo Tomas, the oldest university under the American flag, has been elected rector of the Dominican College at Rosaryville, Louisiana. He was born in Spain but has lived 30 years in the Philippines. Although he speaks English fluently he has never been in the United States.
