GAME TRANSFER IS MADE TODAY TO NEW BUREAU

Bureau of Biological Survey
Takes Over Game Ad-
ministration July 1.

Formal transfer was being effected today of the Alaska Game Warden service and administration of Alaska game laws and regulations, heretofore vested in the office of Governor of Alaska, to J. P. Walker, as Alaska agent of the Bureau of Biological Survey. The change was directed by a resolution passed by Congress a short time before its adjournment early this month.

Mr. Walker said today that the Bureau had not fully perfected its plans for administration and permanent organization. The time since the transfer was directed has been so limited that it has been impossible, he said, to go into all of the details for a comprehensive program which is contemplated, merging the game organization with that which has heretofore been in charge of the land fur-bearing animals and functioning under the Biological Survey.

As soon as he received official notice that there would be a transfer of administration of the game laws, Gov. Bone notified all wardens on the force that their connection with the service would automatically cease on June 30. Several of the old wardens, Mr. Walker said, had applied to the Bureau for appointment and most of them would be retained.

Owing to the fact that funds for maintaining the warden service are limited, he said, it has been considered advisable to diminish the number in order to make it possible for the remaining officers to spend more time in the field thus increasing the efficiency of the force. It will be the aim to avoid duplication of work by game wardens and wardens in the protection service for land fur-bearers.

There have been, under the De-

partment of Interior and directly under the Governor's Office, six game districts each having a warden in charge. Two were in Southeastern Alaska, three in the Third Division and three in the Fourth. For the present, at least, two have been eliminated, one at McCarthy, in the Third and one at Nenana for the Kantishna in the Fourth.

Old officers who have been appointed for continued service by the Bureau of Biological Survey are: E. M. Goddard, of this district; James S. Pitcher, Keichikan, for the South end of the Division; Robert L. Steavens, Cordova, who will also look after the McCarthy district for the present; James G. Moore, of Fairbanks, and Alexander M. Hatley, Kusko-kwim. The Seward district has been discontinued. George C. Cotter has been warden there for the past three years. His work will be taken over, at least for the time being, by A. H. Hardy, warden in the land fur-bearing service. The Kantishna district has also been discontinued. J. M. Burrows, of Nenana, was warden there.

H. W. Terhune, who has been doing special work for the Biological Survey in this district since May 18, will probably be promoted to chief assistant to Mr. Walker and make his headquarters here. Mr. Terhune was connected for several years with Washington State game forces and has had much experience in that line of work. Mr. Walker said. He will make his home here.

With the transfer of the game administration goes, also, the transfer of issuance of Federal hunting licenses. In the past these have been issued from the Governor's office. Mr. Walker will issue them hereafter, beginning tomorrow. Arrangements are being made, he said, so that persons enroute to Western Alaska for hunting trips can secure their licenses while their boats are in port.

MEANS RETURNS FROM SEATTLE CONFERENCE OF DISTRICT AGENTS

A belief that there are fewer violations, proportionately, in Alaska, than in Seattle or other places in the Northwest, was expressed today by Federal Prohibition Director A. G. Means, who returned yesterday from a three weeks visit to Seattle where he attended a conference of district enforcement agents with Chief Hazeltine presiding. The conference generally turned on prohibition enforcement subjects and touched methods of speeding up efficiency of the enforcement bureau.

Mr. Means said he had conferred at length with Mr. Hazeltine relative to additional vessels for Alaskan duty and reached a very satisfactory agreement on the type of craft needed. A plan for them has been submitted to the Washington office of the Bureau, he said.

The local offices of the enforce-

ment director were being moved today from the Malony Building to the fifth floor of the Goldstein Building.
