MORIARTY IS RUMORED NEW DET. MANAGER

Ty Cobb and George Sisler Due for Ax, According to Railbirds.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 8.—Jack McAllister, now assistant to Tris Speaker in Cleveland, is scheduled to supplant George Sisler in charge of the St. Louis Browns next year, with George Moriarty, now an umpire in the American League, coming back to the Detroit club on which he once played third base, successor to Ty Cobb, according to well founded gossip up here.

McAllister was never a big league star, though he saw service with the Cleveland club as a catcher. For five years he has been with Speaker in the role of coach and general handy man. He has plenty of pep and is expected to put life into the Browns, something they have not had under Sisler. It is understood that McAllister goes to St. Louis on Speaker's recommendation.

Moriarty was supposed to be slated to succeed Sisler in St. Louis and not till the Griffins landed in Detroit did they hear that he was booked to succeed Ty Cobb as leader of the Tigers. Cobb is said to be contemplating retirement from baseball altogether, taking up the easy life of a land owner and realtor in Augusta, Ga.

Ump Not Popular

McAllister's cheerful personality makes him popular with the players around the American League circuit, but the same cannot be said of Moriarty. Umpires seldom are popular with players and Moriarty is not one of the popular few, though really he is a fine fellow and worthy of a trial as a big league manager.

While McAllister never achieved fame as a big leaguer, Moriarty ranked among the best third sackers ever in the American League. He was with the New York club for several years and then closed his career with Detroit playing third base and first base. He has been an umpire for more than five years, obtaining the position on the recommendation of Clark C. Griffith, president of the Washington club.

Deal Talked Of

Just what will happen to Sisler nobody seems to know, though there are many conjectures. Some rumors have him going to the Griffins in a deal involving Joe Judge. Others have him slated to go to Philadelphia in a three-cornered deal involving the Washington club. No verifications can be obtained as to the truth of these rumors. At any rate it is a foregone conclusion that Sisler is done as manager of the Browns. Where he plays next year is something else again.
