

CORDOVA IS PROMISED BIG COAL STATION

The Bering river coal fields may save the entire transportation situation in Alaska, according to advices reaching Seattle. Both the Alaska Steamship company boats and Copper River & Northwestern railroad may be burning coal from these fields before midsummer next. Already the Cordova market is promised 50 tons of coal every 24 hours, and this may be increased sufficiently to take care of the railroad and steamship wants. With steadily increasing price of fuel oil the Alaskan Steamship company officials announced some weeks ago that revenues providing for over a million dollars in additional costs of fuel oil for 1921 would have to be provided for.

Falcon Joslin returned from the Kattalla coal fields during the week. He reported his company was now constructing four miles of planked road to get coal to Bering lake from which point it can be barged at high tide to Cordova. This coal will take care of domestic consumption.

If the Joslin company successfully open a coal area during the next few months then the Copper River & Northwestern railroad can extend a branch road 28 miles to load coal from the mine bunkers. This would allow the railroad to place loading bunkers at Cordova, which port would become the fueling point for all western Alaska steamers.

Falcon Joslin says it is slow work combatting department red tape in developing coal leases in Alaska but his associates have not let obstacles stand in the way of eventually making Bering river coal fields productive.

Regarding the oil situation at Kattalla, Mr. Joslin is optimistic. He says the greatest obstacle to the opening of oil pools is the present leasing law, which in his opinion is not liberal or encouraging to the oil prospector. He believes, however, that congress will modify it to save endless delay and litigation.—Alaska Dispatch.

RAILWAY AIDS EMPLOYES TO BUILD HOMES

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5 (by Associated Press).—Methods used in aiding employes to buy Liberty bonds during the war are to be utilized to aid them in building homes are the leading phase of a housing scheme under consideration by the Los Angeles railway, according to an announcement by G. J. Kuhrts recently.

The plans contemplate the setting aside of a fund of \$150,000 to be loaned the employes at a low rate of interest for home building, the loans to be repaid by small deductions from the men's pay checks, Mr. Kuhrts said.

Another phase of the plan is the building of "bungalow courts" where accommodations will be available for the company's employes at low rents and a start was made on this latter phase some time ago.

Most of the new buildings, it is expected, will be built within convenient distance of the company's shops or car barns.
