

CORDOVA HERO AGAIN AWARDED HIGH HONORS

Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Jones, of Camp 89, are in receipt of a beautiful Fourragere, which was awarded to their son, Private John W. Jones, U. S. M. C. R., 18th Company, 5th Regiment, who lost his life in France, during the recent World war, for gallant services rendered. It was accompanied by the following self-explanatory letter from Brigadier General H. C. Haines:

"I am directed by the major general commandant to forward to you herewith Fourragere authorization card No. 6805, to which you are entitled as next of kin of the above-named deceased, by virtue of his having been attached to his organization on at least two occasions for which the same was cited in the French orders of the army. The Fourragere and miniature Fourragere are being forwarded to you under separate cover this date.

"For your information, you are informed that the 5th and 6th Regiments of Marines were cited three times; Boise de Belleau, June 2-13, 1918, Soissons, July 18-19, 1918, and Champagne, October 1-10, 1918; while the 6th Machine Gun Battalion was twice cited, Boise de Belleau, June 2-13, 1918, and Soissons July 18-19, 1918. The Fourragere is therefore a part of the uniform of the above-mentioned organizations, and is worn on the left shoulder by fastening the button-hole of the Fourragere to the left shoulder-strap button, passing the Fourragere underneath the left arm, fastening the loop on the pencil end thereof to the same button, allowing the brass pencil to hang down in front. The Fourragere was awarded these organizations for their fine conduct before the enemy, and by reason of the fact that they were at least twice cited in the French Orders of the Army, i. e., the colors of these units were decorated with the French Croix de Guerre with Palm on at least two different occasions, and the Fourragere is therefore of the colors of the Croix de Guerre (green and red)."

MAYO DISTRICT ROAD WORK OF SEASON OVER

Road Superintendent James McNeill and crew who have been working in the Mayo district the last several months, has arrived in Dawson, says the Dawson News. Coming with Mr. McNeill were: George Fulton, foreman; "Hot Stove" Douglas, Arthur Davidson, Harry Daghish, Barney Brennan, Jack Case and Eugene Roi. They brought down a team of four horses. Eleven days were spent on the road from Minto Bridge to Dawson, and considerable repair work done, especially to the crossings on the Twentymile. The Isaac Lusk road was followed. The arrivals report having met teams or mushers nearly every day. Among them were Malcolm McLaren, with a load of farm produce from Mayo; McDiarmid, with a load of supplies for Mayo; two Yukon Gold teams, with supplies; two teams of Isaac Lusk; Dr. Faulkner, with a load of farm produce, and Joe Hodder, with a woodsaw outfit. Hodder was met yesterday. Dr. Faulkner was at Flat creek, getting on well.

The road crew, of which the men who got in formed an important part, this summer built the fine new road up Duncan creek which connects Mayo Landing with Keno Hill. The road was graded through practically to the foot of Keno Hill, and a fine grade afforded for winter travel. Next season it will be thoroughly ditched and drained and provided with culverts, and made one of the best roads in the territory. An average of eighteen men were engaged on the Duncan road construction this season.

BURN HOUSES AFTER AMBUSH OF POLICEMEN

CORK, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Military headquarters have announced that seven houses in nearby towns with their contents have been burned by the military as a result of the ambush of police near Middleton, when one policeman was killed and eight wounded, two of whom have since died. Inmates of the homes burned are declared to have known of the ambush.

JURY DISAGREES IN OHIO MURDER CASE

CLEVELAND, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—The jury in the case of William S. McGannon, chief justice of the municipal court, charged with second degree murder, disagreed and were discharged, after being deadlocked since Wednesday.

AUSTRIANS FORCE INCREASE IN WAGES

VIENNA, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—An increase of 1,250,000,000 crowns in the civil payroll has been made by the Austrian government as the result of renewed demands by civil employes. They threatened to strike and, as in former instances, the government yielded.

PUGET SOUND SHIPMENTS TO ALASKA GROW

SEATTLE, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Puget sound shipments to Alaska in 1920 totaled \$29,739,734 from January to October, inclusive. There are no figures available for comparison as to the amount of the increase over previous years. The value of the shipments by months was as follows: January, \$1,051,414; February, \$1,160,499; March, \$3,254,781; April, \$5,237,528; May, \$3,486,765; June, \$2,926,398; July, \$4,290,995; August, \$2,892,835; September, \$2,985,368; October, \$2,442,800.

In November, 1901, the shipments to Alaska were valued at \$319,449; December, 1901, \$110,745.

MISSING NAVY BALLOON MEN ARE FOUND O.K.

ROCKAWAY, N. Y., Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—The missing navy balloon A-5598 landed near Moose Frycorty, Ontario, December 14, and the crew are safe there at the Hudson bay trading post, according to a telegram received at the naval air station.

WORKING FOR ROADS TO MAYO DISTRICT

OTTAWA, Jan. 3. — Dr. Alfred Thompson, member of parliament for Yukon, is endeavoring to get enough money put in the estimates of the public works department to give Mayo and Keno wire or wireless communication, and in the estimates of the interior department money with which to build good roads to the mines. Unless these are accepted by the government now, it will be difficult to get them put in later, when parliament meets. Dr. Thompson is having difficulty on account of the government's policy of retrenchment.

ORCHESTRA MEMBERS KILLED BY TRAIN

CLEVELAND, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Six people were killed and two injured, all members of an orchestra, when an automobile in which they were returning from a New Year's eve party was struck by a New York Central train.

STRIKERS WILL OPEN RELIEF MONEY SHOPS

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Amalgamated clothing workers on strike plan to open two stores at which only "relief money" will be accepted. The strikers will be supplied with bills of one dollar to five dollars in value, with small change stamped out of cardboard.

ALBANIA QUAKE TAKE MANY LIVES

PARIS, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Fourteen people were killed, 300 injured and 10,000 made homeless by an earthquake which nearly obliterated Elbassan, Albania, according to dispatches from the Red Cross at Tirana.

TONG WAR STOPPED AT LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3 (by Associated Press).—Outward peace prevailed today in Chinatown following the tong war which started Thursday when two Chinese were killed and a third wounded. Four tong leaders are expected to arrive today to arrange peace.

WOMEN NAMED FOR MUNICIPAL JOBS
