BAD FIRE IN KANSAS CITY

MAN BELIEVED TO HAVE BURNED
TO DEATH AND OTHERS
ARE INJURED

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 13.—(AP)—The result of a fire in two large grain elevators here an old man is missing, who is believed to have been burned to death, and fifteen others injured, some of them seriously. Most of those injured sustained their hurts while fighting the fire which was only controlled after several hours of very hard work on the part of the fire department, assisted by citizens. The cause of the fire is said to have been spontaneous combustion resulting from an explosion of grain dust and barley.

MAN SHORTAGE FOR THE NAVY

NAVY DEPARTMENT COMPLAINS
OF NOT HAVING ENOUGH MEN
FOR WAR VESSELS

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The navy department has announced that there is a serious shortage of seamen and other sailors with the ships of the navy on the Atlantic coast. The shortage is due, it is stated, to the fact that many of the men enlisted for naval service for the duration of the war, have received their discharge. It is further stated that many of the war vessels are now moored at docks at various places for the reason that there are not enough men to man them properly.

CARLISLE PUTS LAUNCH ON WAYS

FINISHES RIVER WORK FOR THE
SEASON—DOWN RIVER DIS-
TRICTS QUIET

Special Agent Carlisle, G. I. O., who makes his headquarters in Fairbanks and spends most of his time coming from Eagle to the Kusko-kwim and back to Fairbanks, arrived in town yesterday with the land office launch Alaska which he is now engaged in taking out of the water. He has had enough of the river travel for one year and is awaiting impatiently the coming of snows so that he can become a dog musher.

Speaking of the conditions along the lower river, Mr. Carlisle stated that there was little activity at any point. He confirms previous reports that regarding a serious fish shortage during the coming winter.

There is still one chance, he said, that sufficient salmon can be caught for dog feed, this being in the run of silver salmon which is due this month. If this fails, he said, a serious condition will confront the river natives before spring arrives.

OREGON AT SEATTLE
SEATTLE, Sept. 13.—(AP)—The historic battleship Oregon, forerunner of the Pacific fleet, arrived here today. It is from her decks that President Wilson and Secretary Daniels will make a review of the fleet on Saturday.

JAPAN MAY NOT RATIFY TREATY

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.—(AP)—Haru Gotta, member of the Japanese national commission who is now in this city, having recently arrived here from the peace conference in Paris, states that it is his belief that Japan will refuse to ratify the peace treaty if the United States excludes the clause regarding Shantung peninsula in its ratification proceedings. This statement has led to considerable talk here both for and against ratification but it is generally conceded that there is nothing that can be done regarding the matter until the senate acts.

COLORADO MOB LYNCHES TWO

PUEBLO, Colo., Sept. 13.—(AP)—A mob of several hundred men, armed to the teeth, tonight took two Mexicans from the local police station and hung them to the railroad bridge across the river here. The Mexicans were being held by the police in connection with the murder of a city patrolman. The police at first prepared to defend the jail against the mob but, seeing that they were overpowered by a superior force, decided that discretion was the better part of valor and gave up their prisoners.

Such action has been anticipated for some time owing to the fact that it is generally known that the ministry is at odds with the president and the premier.

HEAVY QUAKE IS FELT IN ITALY

EARTHQUAKE SHAKES SEVERAL
TOWNS, KILLS ONE AND IN-
JURES MANY

ROME, Italy, Sept. 13.—(AP)—One of the heaviest earthquakes in years visited the province of Siena today, according to information received here several villages being severely shaken up. At Pannocostano a number of houses were shaken down, one person killed and several injured by falling debris while at Belle, ten persons were injured.

STEAMER AFIRE REACHES PORT

MAKES PORT FIRE IN HOLD—IS
EXTINGUISHED BY LAND
FIRE FIGHTERS

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—A report received here tonight is to the effect that the British steamship Vestris arrived at St. Lucia, British West Indies, with a fire burning fiercely in her hold. It is also stated, however, that the fire was suppressed shortly after the ship arrived in port. The Vestris was bound from New York for Rio Janeiro.

SEARCH TO BE DISCONTINUED

MISSING AVIATORS TO BE LEFT
TO THEIR FATE, WHATEVER
IT MAY HAVE BEEN

SAN DIEGO, Sept. 13.—(AP)—It is announced here tonight that all search for the missing army aviators Waterhouse and Connelly has been given up by the war and navy departments. The men have been missing for nearly a month and during that time practically every foot of ground over which they could have traveled enroute from Yuma, Arizona, to this city, has been scoured for some clue to their whereabouts, but all to no avail.

DENEKINE IS BEATING BOLS

DESTROYS TWO BOLSHEVIKI
REGIMENTS AND CAPTURES
9,000 PRISONERS.

LONDON, Sept. 13.—(AP)—It is officially announced tonight from the British war office that General Denekine has gained another victory of considerable proportions over the bolsheviks. The battle, it is stated, took place at Tsaritsyn. Denekine is being credited with the complete destruction of two bolshevik regiments and the capture of 9,000 bolshevik soldiers.
