THE NEW STRIKE IS NOT AUTHENTICATED

The Nome Nugget in its weekly issue of September 8, in speaking of the strike recently reported from the headwaters of the Kobuk, says: Andy Garbine, an old timer of the Kiana section who arrived in Nome on the last trip of the Silver Wave, says that the only reason for believing that a new strike has been made near the headwaters of the Kobuk appears to be in the failure of a number of Kianaites to return after making the rather lengthy journey to the Walker lake country, where the strike is supposed to be. Jimmie Cross, Frank Malfetti and Jack Sackett are reported to have gone up the Kobuk in the spring and have not returned up to the present. The men are said to have undertaken the trip because of a report that an Eskimo had found some gold on one of the streams running into the lake. Garbine says that he is not aware of the correctness of the Eskimo story. Garbine is located on Center creek, a tributary of Squirrel river and is the owner of a considerable area of dredging ground which is attracting some attention from local parties, who are said to be figuring on drilling the property with a view to installing a dredge next summer. Garbine reports that the Clery creek section is still the scene of numerous mining activities with practically all operators doing well.
