## BUZARD MILL IS INSTALLED

James Buzard has completed the installation of a ten stamp mill upon his quartz property on Bear creek, near Hope, and with the opening of next season the stamps will be dropping. It is figured that the mill will handle forty tons of ore each day. In addition to the mill, an electric light plant is installed and is now in working order. Buzard employed seventy-five men during the greater part of the season.

During the winter development in way of blocking out ore for next season's operations will be carried on without cessation.

Hope is getting to be quite a settlement. Every house is occupied and new buildings are going up.

Bill Donohue, Gus Olson, Si. Atwell and Tony Santelmoe formed a party which arrived from the Iditarod yesterday, just in time to catch the outgoing steamer Admiral Sampson. Donohue and Olson are mining on Yankee creek and are successful operators. Atwell is a transportation man who runs the steamer Little Delta. He says there will be quite a little travel from the Iditarod through Seward this winter.

About every foot-loose person in the Knik-Susitna region is going, or has gone to the Matanuska-Nelchina diggings. Reports from the new camp continue highly favorable.

George Riley, a prominent interior man, is assembling a big dredger on Otter creek, in the Iditarod district, getting ready for next season's work.

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
