NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that the following is a copy of a resolution passed by the common council of the Town of Seward, Alaska, on the 29th day of May, 1916.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the common council of the town of Seward, territory of Alaska.

That the said common council hereby declares its intention to improve Adams Street, in said town by grading of the same according to the grade established by the City Engineer and adopted by the said council, between Fourth Avenue and the Adams Street crossing of the Alaska Northern Railway.

Two thirds of the expense and cost of the improvement to be assessed and taxed to the abutting property.

The City Engineer has made estimate of the approximate cost of said grading to be the sum of one thousand three hundred and five dollars (\$1,305.00). To each lot the sum of fifty cents per front foot of the property abutting on said proposed improvement; That is to say the total cost of said improvement will be seventy-five cents per front foot of the property abutting on said improvement, two thirds of which cost is to be paid by the abutting property owners.

Be it resolved by the common council of the Town of Seward, Territory of Alaska.

That the common council hereby declares its intention to improve Adams Street, in said town, by constructing a plank side walk, thereon, on the North side thereof, between Fourth Avenue and the Adams Street crossing of the Alaska Northern Railroad; also the necessary street and alley crossings therewithin attached. Said side walk to be ten feet wide and built according to ordinance. Two thirds of the cost and expense thereof to be assessed against the abutting owners.

The City Engineer has filed plans

for said walk and proposed improvements, and made estimate of the cost of the proposed improvements, to be one thousand, two hundred (\$1,200.00) Dollars.—The cost to each lot owner will be approximately one (\$1.10) dollar and ten cents per front foot, of the property abutting on said improvement: That is to say the total cost will be one dollar and sixty five cents (\$1.65) per front foot, two thirds of which will be taxed to the abutting property.

GERMAN AMERICANS AGAINST BOTH T. R. AND WILSON

CHICAGO, May 27.—"German-Americans unreservedly against both Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson for president of the United States," was the slogan Illinois German-Americans expected to plant in the minds of the officials of every German-American alliance attending the meeting of the National Alliance which convenes in Chicago tomorrow.

One hundred officials of state alliance and editors of German newspapers are expected to attend.

"Opposition to Wilson and Roosevelt is an Illinois German-American idea and we expect to promulgate it throughout the United States," Dr. Herman Gerhard, chairman of the political committee declared today.

"I know the man I want to see president," Dr. Gerhard said. "I may get a chance to vote for him." He would not say who his choice is.

"I do not believe the republicans will nominate Roosevelt and unless Wilson is nominated on the first ballot I don't believe he will be nominated."
