RICH STRIKE OF GOLD MADE ON MT. JUNEAU

JUNEAU. — John Perelle has run across rich bunches of quartz on the Goldstein group of claims on the salmon creek side of Mt. Juneau and adjoining the Hallum group.

In a large piece of quartz brought to the city by Mr. Perelle may be seen specks of gold sticking out. If such samples were found in almost any other mining camp they would cause a wild stampede.

It is not the first time, either, that equally as rich hunks of quartz have been taken from the same group, or from different places on Mt. Juneau, but what makes it important is the fact that it is said to have been found at several points in the 48-foot prospect tunnel which has been driven to cross-cut the ledge on the Goldstein group.

Mining men believe that the time is not far distant when the whole Salmon side of Mt. Juneau will be worked as extensively as in the same Juneau gold belt of the Alaska-Juneau Company and the Alaska Gastineau Company.—Ex.

BEATING THE DRY LAW

During a recent investigation at Seattle, inaugurated by the State Board of Pharmacy for the purpose of inquiring into the case of twenty-seven Seattle druggists who had been charged with violating the dry law, evidence was submitted which showed that the president of the board had taken out liquor permits sufficient to keep a large community supplied. The following is the list which was introduced at the quiz:

January 16—Forty-five gallons of alcohol; one case of champagne; fifteen gallons of brandy; one case of Burgundy wine.

February 13—Thirteen and one-half barrels of sherry; one half barrel of port; ten gallons of gin; five gallons of brandy; one case of Scotch whiskey; three cases of brandy; one case of malt Rainier; one case of whiskey; one case of gin; one case of cordial; one case of vermouth; one keg of rum.

March 29—One barrel of whiskey; one case of Plymouth gin; one case Gordon gin; one case Scotch whiskey; one case of Bourbon whiskey.

May 25—One barrel of whiskey.

June 19—Eighteen dozen bottles of malt Rainier.

In addition to the items enumerated, it was charged also that the president of the board had laid in a large stock of whiskey before the dry law went into effect, something like twenty-five barrels of booze having been purchased before the first of the year.

REPORT MADE ON ROADS IN ALL DISTRICTS

The Gateway has received a copy of the annual report of the board of road commissioners for Alaska, headed by Col. Richardson, giving the work in detail in various districts and the cost per mile.

The board has been in existence 10 years and during that time have maintained 901.8 miles of wagon road and 577.5 miles of winter sled roads and 2,167.5 miles of trail. In this work the board has expended a total of \$1,489,413.83 of territorial funds accruing in the "Alaska Fund," and \$1,600,000 in special appropriations from congress, making a total of \$3,089,413.83.

After two years' experience the board gives the following cost:
Wagon road, \$2,000 per mile.
Winter sled road, \$250 per mile.
Trail, \$100 per mile.

This includes surveys, maintenance and all overhead charges since the beginning of the work.

OFFICE OF STAMP DEPUTY WILL SOON BE ABOLISHED

JUNEAU.—Harley J. Turner, deputy collector of Internal Revenue for the sale of stamps under the Emergency Act, has received instruction from David J. Williams, collector of internal revenue, that the Juneau office will be abolished after Oct. 15. The abolition of the office is due to the repeal of Congress of the provisions of the tax law requiring certain wines, cordials and liquors, instruments, deeds, and other writings to be stamped with a revenue stamp. After Oct. 15th, the old regime will be restored when cigar makers, brewers and others need stamps, that is, they must send direct to Tacoma therefor.—Dispatch.
