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## PRESIDENT DECLARES COMMISSION WILL SETTLE PROBLEM

SPEECH AT CHEYENNE TAKES UP COAL PROBLEMS AND COAL COMMISSION

CHEYENNE, June 26.—President Harding, in his speech here this afternoon, discussed the nation's coal problems, in which he mentioned the industry, the consuming public and the government's interest in all phases of coal operations. The president recorded himself as being opposed to nationalizing the mines, and declared that the United States coal commission would bring the country a new understanding of the problem and would point out the solution in behalf of a vital public interest.

### Trip Continuous Ovation

SALT LAKE, June 26.—President Harding arrived here at noon today for a twelve hour visit, after an automobile ride from Ogden through fertile valleys lying between snow-capped mountain ranges. He was accompanied by Governor Mabey, and Senators Smoot and King. During the 40-mile ride his trip was a continuous ovation.

### NEW BISHOP FOR TUCSON

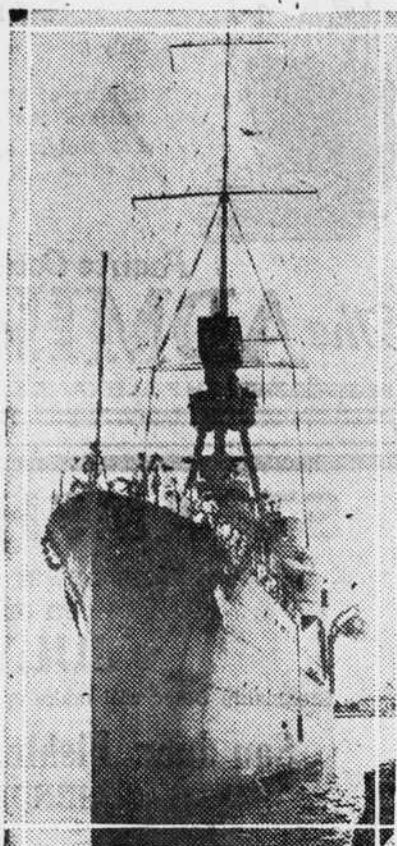

## LEADING BUSINESS MEN OF DETROIT OPPOSED TO FORD

SOME SAY HE'S NOT PROPERLY EQUIPPED FOR PRESIDENT'S CHAIR—WORKERS FOR HIM

DETROIT, June 25.—What do the people of this city—Henry Ford's home town—think of Mr. Ford as a presidential candidate?

More than a score of men and women in nearly every walk of life were asked this question here today, and their replies reveal a cross-section of political thought that is as novel as it is interesting. Summed up, there is very little indecision on the part of the average voter regarding Mr. Ford. The average Detroit voter is either for Ford or against Ford.

Leading businessmen and bankers to whom the question was put were chary about the use of their names, but nevertheless expressed decisive views. Men and women in other ranks of life gladly gave their names and expressed views just as decisive as the bankers and business men. Practically everyone declared that Mr. Ford would carry his own city by a tremendous plurality were he a presidential candidate. Many of these statements were made without regard to what ticket might contain his name as a presidential candidate.

## AIRPLANE SUCCESSFULLY REFUELED IN THE AIR

SAN DIEGO, June 26.—Captain Lowell Smith and Lieuts. Richter, Hines and Siefert this afternoon successfully refueled an airplane in midair, while flying at ninety miles an hour.

## CHAMBER DISCUSSES ENTERTAINMENT PLANS

At the weekly luncheon of the Seward Chamber of Commerce, Mayor L. V. Ray today made a report on the plans for entertaining the President and his party. The present itinerary provides for a trip from Seattle to Juneau; from Juneau direct to Seward; Seward to Fairbanks, Fairbanks to Cordova, and thence to Seattle. A two-hour stop in Seward is planned during which time President Harding will address the people in A. B. Hall.

A committee of four citizens will be appointed to entertain the Secretaries accompanying the President.

The Elks Club have turned over their hall for use by the newspaper men accompanying the party.

It was decided to hold a small celebration July Fourth for the children of Seward. A dance will be given by the Civic committee Saturday night to raise funds for this purpose.

Plans were made for entertaining the Brooklyn Eagle party. Mel Horner reported progress on the trail being brushed out to Harding glacier at the head of Spruce creek.

NEW YORK, June 26.—John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has announced a gift of \$150,000 to be distributed among the hospitals of the United States and Canada, for the purpose of promoting the use of "insulin" in the treatment of diabetes.

### ONE DEATH, FIVE PROSTRATIONS

### MARKS NOW IN CELLAR

## STREAMS OF LAVA ARE CRAWLING IN ON ITALIAN CITY

CATANIA, Sicily, June 26.—Lava flowed over the railway station at Cerro today, and blocked the roadway between the town and the outlying districts. The highways are literally strewn with the possessions of the fleeing and panic stricken refugees from the villages in the affected district. The Red Cross is caring for tens of thousands, furnishing food and clothing.

Five streams of lava, which burst from the crater of Etna are slowly crawling toward Linguaglossa, and an army of engineers are digging large trenches which they hope will divert the flow from the apparently doomed city.

The scenes around the base of the volcano reminds one of an inferno. Sulphurous smoke hangs over the district, which is lit by the crawling flames of the lava.

### ARRESTED FOR SEDITION

### EARTH SHOCKS REGISTERED

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Earth shocks, beginning at 3:35 o'clock this morning and lasting for an hour and a half were registered on the Georgetown University seismograph here. They were estimated to have occurred 2700 miles from Washington and to have been of great intensity.

## JIMMY WILDE PUTS UP GAME FIGHT TO RETAIN TITLE

BATTERED AND BEATEN FROM FIRST VETERAN FIGHTER STAYS SEVEN ROUNDS

New York, June 26.—(Delayed)—Pancho Villa the battling Filipino added another gem to his crown in defeating Jimmy Wilde, Monday last, with a stiff right to the jaw, putting the world's flyweight champion out in the seventh round of a scheduled fifteen round match.

From the first round it was plain that Villa would be the new champion Wilde failed to show any signs of retaining his title but despite being defeated from the start of his fight by his opponent's vicious punches he never gave up hope, always trying desperately to land one of his famous blows on Villa's jaw. However, the little brown man proved too clever and the once noted boxer went down, fighting courageously like a hero.

The battle throughout was one of the most spectacular in the history of the prize ring. Villa rushed his opponent with a slashing, terrific assault, and had Wilde groggy in the first round. Wilde seemed but a shell of the once famous boxer and only his marvelous courage and nerve kept up through the seven rounds. Bleeding from cuts around the mouth and cheeks, and with his right eye closed the gamey Britisher occasionally took the offensive, but his punches were feeble. Though his legs sagged and body wavered under the devastating attack, his bulldog tenacity kept him in the thick of the fray. As he went to the corner bloody and hopeless at the end of the sixth round, the crowd pleaded with the referee to stop the slaughter, but Wilde shook his head and staggered to the center of the ring for the fatal seventh. The Filipino, sensing victory, sprang from his corner like a wildcat, raining rights and lefts on Wilde's head, who gradually gave ground, gamely but ineffectually trying to fight back. Villa then shot his right cross to the former champion's jaw and he went down and out.

The crowd of more than forty thousand cheered Wilde for his gameness. Tom O'Rourke announced that Villa has signed a contract for a match with Genaro at the Polo grounds about September 1. Jimmy Wilde is still in bed recovering from his recent battle with the new champion last Monday. Physicians say he is in no danger though badly beaten up. His left eye is still closed and his right is almost as bad, besides a gash on his cheek and a cut four inches long testifying to the force whereat he hit the canvas from the knockout blow. Revised figures place the attendance at 23,000 and the receipts at \$94,590, from which Villa will receive \$12,000.
