CHURCH EXECUTIVE HERE

Dr. G. Pitt Boers, executive secretary of the Home Mission Society of the Northern Baptist Convention, accompanied by Mrs. Boers arrived in Kodiak recently.

The purpose of their visit, is Dr. Boers' inspection of Kodiak for the laying of plans for a new Baptist Church edifice. Due to the rapid growth of this community, the present church is very inadequate for the number of congregation who attend the services. Dr. Boers has a set of blueprints with him that call for a structure measuring approximately forty feet by seventy feet. This building will be divided up into a sanctuary, a Narthex, Pastor's study, class-rooms, the chancel and a basement which will be used for social gatherings. The total expenditures for this structure will be nearly \$15,000 and one which Kodiak will well be proud of.

It is anticipated that the construction work will be gin in the very near future, just as soon as minor alterations have been made in the specifications and title to the ground is (next column) cleared.

Dr. Boers and the pastor, the Rev. W.A. Warner will be pleased to meet any of the parishioners here, who might be interested in the church program and would like to know more about it.

KRAFT TO OPEN SOON

NAVY BOAT UNLOADS

The U.S. naval freighter "Vega" was a recent arrival at the Base Camp at Women's Bay, where she is unloading about 4,000 tons of freight consigned to the naval base construction camp.

Of 14,000 tons gross weight, and carrying a crew of 110 men including a compliment of naval R.O.T.C. cadets, she usually makes the run to the Pribilof Islands for the seal pelts and will do so after this trip, according to Capt. Eason.

Many of her crew are taking advantage of shore-leave to take photographs of Kodiak and purchase souvenirs of this old historical town, many years old.
