## NATIONAL

Chicago - With the Democratic Convention coming to a close early Friday morning the country now awaits the eventful campaigning of the respective nominees. A few "die-hards" are bitterly opposing the non renomination of Garner as running mate for Roosevelt while still a few determined democrats are fighting the convention's choice by upholding the "third term" idea. Roosevelt is content to let the nation decide whether or not it wants to uphold a certain ideal because of tradition or whether it will be content towards giving him continued support. Roosevelt's acceptance speech was considered by experts in political matters to be one of clever content. He is not very likely to do very much distant campaigning more than likely leaving such to his running mate, Wallace.

Seattle - Delegates to the convention from the western states, Washington, Idaho and Alaska fought pressure from Wallace groups to support other candidates for vice-presidential nomination. Alaska while pledged for Bankhead decided to change at the last minute giving Bankhead three votes and Wallace three. Washington's vote was split among five candidates with Wallace getting only one and one half. Idaho gave ten to McHutt, Oregon ten to Wallace.

New York - Hull and fifteen delegates are enroute to attend the Pan American convention at Havana Cuba which is to be held there in the very near future. It is expected that President Roosevelt may also attend.

New York - Wendell L. Wilkie, GOP presidential candidate, summoned 12 party leaders from all sections of the country to guide his campaign and included workers for his two leading opponents for the nomination, Gov. E. E. Stassen of Minnesota heads the committee which includes Mrs. Ruth Hanna McCormick, Simms-Davis and S. Ingalls of Ohio who aided R. A. Taft; Rep. Joseph Martin, Gov. Raymond Baldwin of Connecticut; Gov. Ralph Carr of Colorado; Sen. John Townsend, Jr., of Delaware. Wilkie said he would refuse corporate contributions, also any sum exceeding \$5,000 (see p. 8)

## FOREIGN

Berlin - Speaking before the Reichstag tonight Hitler addressed one more final appeal for a reasoning with England. He declared that if England insists on continuing the fight he will destroy her world Empire. He emphasized the fact that he was not asking for peace in the voice of a victor and demanding capitulation of the vanquished but rather as a victor proposing a reasonable peace. Hitler said that a parently British statesman had no conception of the destruction should he pay a visit to England in complying with his threats to destroy London. The Dictator did not say definitely just what he expected Churchill's reply would be in regard to his peace offer to England but at the same time he left no doubt but that any sort of peace would certainly be on German terms.

London - The Royal Air Force continued with their bombing assaults on German supply concentration points along the coast of France and Holland. The cruiser Sydney of the Australian fleet is reported to have engaged in battle with one of the cruisers of the Italian fleet, resulting in the sinking of the Italian ship. Italy claims to have destroyed a British submarine in the Ionian Sea.

London - With the sinking of two British merchantmen along the coast of the West Indies it is believed that another German Sea Raider is playing havoc with British ships.

Shanghai - Breaking into the apartment of Ial Arvin, an American correspondent and writer, Japanese police seized Arvin and confiscated his manuscript declaring it to be anti-Japanese. Arvin objected to the forced entrance declaring that the manuscript was only a biography of an American who had spent several years in China and obviously was not an attack on Japan.

France - France made an appeal to Germany to-day to cease from taking French food supplies declaring that soon famine must result in France should Germany continue to do so. As Germany, seizing much foodstuffs for German soldiers the French people are now beginning to worry.
