

chiropractic teaching a course of not less than three years, as follows: Anatomy, chemistry, physiology, symptomatology, and chiropractic principles of diagnosis.

Provides that the Board of Chiropractic Examiners may revoke licenses for immoral or unprofessional conduct, habitual drunkenness, misstatement in securing license, or where such person has been convicted for the commission of a crime. Provides for a fee of \$7.50 a year for renewal of the license. Provides for temporary permits to practice until meeting of the board. Authorizes the board to make investigation and revoke licenses. Provides that licenses must be filed with the county clerk. Authorizes Governor to remove members of the board for misconduct.

ACT NO. 490.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to prohibit the sale or giving away of cigarettes or cigarette papers to minors and to regulate the sale to other persons.

Prohibits the sale of cigarettes without first obtaining a license from the State Board of Health. Fixes the license for wholesalers at \$50.00 per annum and the license fee for the retail dealers in cigarettes at \$20.00 per annum. Prohibits the sale or giving away to minors under 18 years of age tobacco in any form, or cigarette papers.

ACT NO. 491.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act creating the Firemen's Relief Fund.

Provides that the mayor, city clerk, chief of the fire department of each city or town in State, together with two members of the fire department shall constitute a Board of Trustees for the Firemen's Relief and Pension Fund. Provides that members of the fire department who have served for a period of twenty years shall be retired from such service and shall be paid from the pension fund one-half of his salary. Provides that where persons become physically or mentally disabled while in the service of the fire department in consequence of the performance of his duty, shall be retired and be paid a monthly pension equal to one-half of the amount of his salary. Provides that during a temporary sickness or disability of any such firemen all hospital expenses shall be paid out of said fund and the firemen shall be paid the sum of \$5.00 per week. Provides that in case such person loses his life in the performance of his duty, a sum equal to one-half of his salary per month shall be paid to his widow, or in case no widow, then to his child or children until they shall be sixteen years of age, or if no children then to his father or mother if they were dependent upon him.

Provides that in order to secure money for said fund one-half of the annual tax of two per cent on all premiums collected by fire, tornado and domestic insurance corporations of America, as provided by Section 113 of Act 190 of the General Assembly of the State of Arkansas, in all cities of the State of Arkansas coming within the provisions of the Act, shall be set aside and held as the Firemen's Pension Fund.

ACT NO. 492.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to levy taxes for State purposes.

Provides that after the passage of this Act there shall be levied on all property, real and personal, within the State of Arkansas, a total state tax of eight and seven-tenths mills.

ACT NO. 493.

Approved March 25, 1921.

An Act providing for the kind of insurance that may be written in the State.

Provides that corporations may be formed to enter this State to effect insurance for the following purposes: Fire insurance, marine insurance, life insurance, disability insurance, liability, fidelity insurance, and other casualty insurance, etc.

Provides that mutual insurance companies may transact any kind of insurance authorized by the Act, unless capital stock is specifically required. Provides that companies other than mutual assessment companies shall maintain proper and legal reserves on business written in this State. Provides that no insurance corporation or fraternal society may hold or convey real estate, except the building in which it has its principal office requisite for its actual and convenient transaction of its business, or such as may be conveyed to it by mortgage, deed of trust or otherwise, or such as it may purchase at sales upon deeds of trust, mortgages or judgments made for loans, debts, etc.

Provides for the merger of two or more insurance companies. Provides that the funds of domestic insurance companies may be invested in bonds of the United States, State of Arkansas, of any county or municipal improvement district. Such funds may be invested in notes or bonds secured by first mortgages or deeds of trusts on real estate, for not more than one-half of the value thereof.

Provides that all casualty companies, in addition to making the deposit required by law, shall file a bond in the sum of \$20,000.00. Prohibits any person from acting as agent for any bond or surety company, unless such company has a capital stock of \$250,000.00, capital stock fully paid and unless \$50,000.00 is invested in bonds created by the laws of this State or of the United States. Provides that all forms of bonding contracts must be approved by the Insurance Commissioner of the State. Provides the method for the organization of Insurance Companies within the State of Arkansas, and fixes the fees to be collected by the Insurance Commissioner from the Insurance Companies operating within the State.

ACT NO. 494.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to regulate the registration of motor vehicles and for other purposes.

Prohibits the operation of any motor vehicle over the highways of this State until the same has been registered. Provides for a registration fee on all automobiles equipped with pneumatic tires used for the transportation of passengers, a fee of 25 per cent per horse power for each horse power generated by the motor propelling such vehicle, and 25 cents per hundred pounds on the gross weight of the vehicle load.

Fixes the registration fee for motor trucks equipped with pneumatic tires, ranging from \$15.00 per annum for trucks of one ton or less capacity to \$25.00 per annum for trucks of six tons capacity. Prohibits the operation of any truck of more than six tons capacity over the roads of this State.

Provides for trucks equipped with solid tires one and one-half times the rate above set out.

Fixes the registration fee for the operation of trailers and semi-trailers on a sliding scale of from \$10.00 for trailers of one ton or less capacity to \$50.00 for trailers of five-ton capacity. Fixes a minimum fee for all automobiles, buses, trucks, trailers or semi-trailers at \$10.00. Fixes the fee for the registration of motorcycles at \$5.00 and motorcycle sidecars at \$2.50.

Provides for the method of registration and the payment of the fees provided for in the Act. Provides that said fees shall be for the calendar year, but if a certificate is issued after July 31 of said year the charge shall be one-half of that for the calendar year.

ACT NO. 495.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to fix the salaries of officers and employees of certain departments of State Government.

The Secretary of the History Commission shall receive a salary of \$2,700.00, and may employ one clerk at \$1,800.00.

The Commissioner of Labor and Statistics shall receive a salary of \$2,400.00, and may employ a deputy at \$2,100.00, and one stenographer at \$1,200.00.

The State Mine Inspector shall receive a salary of \$2,000.00.

The Commissioner of Mines, Manufacture and Agriculture shall receive a salary of \$3,600.00, and may employ one deputy at \$2,400.00, one clerk at \$2,100.00, one chemist at \$3,000.00, one assistant chemist at \$2,400.00, six inspectors at \$1,800.00, one stenographer at \$1,800.00, one deputy at \$2,400.00, one clerk at \$1,800.00, one stenographer at \$1,500.00, three inspectors at \$1,300.00, one deputy at \$2,400.00, one clerk at \$1,800.00, one stenographer at \$1,500.00, one deputy at \$2,400.00, one agricultural statistician at \$1,200.00, stenographer at \$1,500.00.

The Superintendent of Public Instruction shall receive a salary of \$3,600.00, and may employ one assistant at \$2,400.00, one deputy at \$2,100.00, and one stenographer at \$1,500.00.

The Supreme Court may employ one reporter at \$3,000.00, one librarian at \$2,400.00, one assistant librarian at \$1,800.00, and five clerks at \$1,800.00.

The State Oil Inspector may employ one chief clerk at \$1,800.00, one stenographer at \$1,500.00, and seven inspectors at \$1,500.00 each.

ACT NO. 496.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to amend Act No. 113 of the Acts of 1913, entitled "An Act for the organization and control of Banks."

Amends the laws relative to the organization of banks so as to provide that the State Bank Department shall exist for an indefinite period, but not as a permanent office. Provides that before the Commissioner shall issue a charter to any bank he shall determine that the community in which the bank is to serve needs such an institution. Provides that upon the commissioner taking charge of the property and business of an insolvent bank, the commissioner shall be vested at law and in equity with the full and unconditional ownership and entitled to the property thereof. Authorizes banks organized under the laws of this State to purchase, own and hold shares of the capital stock of any corporation organized under Act of Congress approved December 24, 1919, known as the Federal Reserve Act. Provides that a depositor may recover damages for the wrongful dishonor of his check only upon application and proof that such damages have resulted to him from such dishonor.

ACT NO. 497.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to appropriate funds for certain special services and purchasing of equipment for the State Auditorial Department.

Appropriates the sum of \$981.25 for special services of C. E. Tool, D. H. Baulfour and Mrs. Lorena Jackson. Appropriates the sum of \$2,047.37 for paying claims incidental to the purchase and use of automobile for said department.

ACT NO. 499.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to provide for the superannuated teachers of the Arkansas School for the Blind.

Provides that any female teacher totally blind who shall have taught for twenty-five years in the Arkansas School for the Blind shall be unable to perform regular service as a teacher shall remain in the institution during the remainder of her life free of charge and shall perform such minor service and work as the superintendent may direct.

ACT NO. 500.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to make appropriation for the equipment and supplies for the State Treasurer's Office.

Appropriates the sum of \$1,200.00 for the purchasing of equipment and supplies for the State Treasurer's office for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921.

ACT NO. 503.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to amend Sections 5636, 8880, 8883 and 8825 of Crawford & Moses Digest.

Provides for the payment by the State of part of the salaries of county superintendents of schools. Provides that the State Board of Education is authorized to pay the county superintendent of schools of each county the sum of \$1,500.00 per annum as part of the salaries, provided, the County Board of Education shall have met the requirements prescribed by the State Board of Education.

ACT NO. 507.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to enable the State Normal School Board to purchase the Caddo Club for dormitory purposes.

Authorizes the said Board to spend the sum of \$14,000.00 for the purchase of lots 16, 18 and 18 of Block 62, Boulevard Addition to the City of Conway.

ACT NO. 512.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to require the Chancellor of the Tenth Chancery District to give twelve days out of the year to holding Chancery Court in Scott County.

Requires the Chancellor of the 10th Chancery District to give 12 days a year to holding such court in Scott County.

ACT NO. 513.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to amend Section 917 of Crawford & Moses Digest.

Amends said section so as to provide that railroad companies may transport property free of cost or at reduced rates for railroad eating houses.

ACT NO. 516.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to make appropriations to pay certain miscellaneous deficiency claims.

Appropriates the sum of \$37,166.75 to pay various deficiency claims against the State Government.

ACT NO. 518.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to appropriate money for the salary of Boiler Inspector and Current expenses of the department for the months of January and February, 1921.

Appropriates \$616.66 out of the Boiler Inspection Fund to pay the salary of the Boiler Inspector and expenses of the department for the months of January and February, 1921.

ACT NO. 519.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to authorize the State Plant

Board to take action to prevent the introduction into the State of any insect pest or plant disease.

Authorizes the chief inspector of the State Plant Board to take action to prevent the introduction into the State of any insect, pest or plant disease, and authorizes him to provide for the eradication of such insect, pest or plant disease, should the same be found within the State.

ACT NO. 520.

Approved March 21, 1921.

An Act to appropriate funds for the maintenance of the Supreme Court for the period ending June 30, 1921.

Appropriates the sum of \$10,775.00 to pay the salaries of the judges, stenographers, librarian, assistant librarian, supreme court reporter, clerk's fees, current expenses and printing and binding for the period ending June 30, 1921.

ACT NO. 521.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to appropriate money to pay the per diem and mileage of the presidential electors.

Appropriates the sum of \$500.00 to pay the mileage and per diem of the presidential electors elected at the last general election.

ACT NO. 523.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to provide for the paving of part of West Seventh Street adjoining the State Capitol.

Authorizes the Secretary of State to contract for the paving of said street. Appropriates the sum of \$8,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary for that purpose.

ACT NO. 524.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to refund to Cross, Craighead and Poinsett counties certain funds erroneously collected for tick eradication.

Appropriates the sum of \$3,722.75 out of the Northwest Arkansas Cattle Tick Eradication Fund to refund certain amounts erroneously paid into the State Treasury by the counties above mentioned.

ACT NO. 525.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to provide for the care, maintenance and instruction of blind babies and children too small and too backward to enter the State School for the Blind.

Provides that the Superintendent of the State School for the Blind may contract with institutions furnishing facilities for the care, maintenance and education of such persons at a price of not more than \$1.50 per day. Provided that such superintendent has the consent of the parents of guardian of such children.

ACT NO. 526.

Approved March 23, 1921.

An Act to provide a reform school for negro juvenile convicts.

Provides that the Board of Managers of the Boys' Industrial School shall provide a suitable school for negroes, separate and apart from the white inmates of the Industrial School. Directs said board to select a suitable tract of land or not less than 100 acres on which to erect said school. Directs said board to proceed with the erection of necessary buildings and authorizes it to use the labor of the inmates of the school. Authorizes the board to employ a superintendent for such school. Appropriates the sum of \$15,000.00 for the purposes of the Act.

ACT NO. 527.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to authorize the Secretary of State to employ an additional clerk and to make appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

Authorizes the Secretary of State to employ an additional clerk at a salary of \$1,800.00 per annum. Appropriates the sum of \$1,800.00 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922, and appropriates the sum of \$1,800.00 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

ACT NO. 528.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to improve the acoustics of the Senate Chamber and the hall of the House of Representatives and to appropriate the necessary money therefor.

Authorizes the Secretary of State to enter into contract for the improvement of the acoustics in such chambers and appropriates the sum of \$13,750.00 for that purpose.

ACT NO. 529.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to aid in the construction of a permanent road from the town of Booneville to the Arkansas State Tuberculosis Sanatorium.

Appropriates the sum of \$15,000.00 out of the Highway Improvement Fund to assist the Booneville District in the building of a road from the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium to the Town of Booneville, Arkansas.

ACT NO. 530.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to make appropriations for the Department of Public Instruction.

Appropriates the sum of \$18,600.00 for the salaries and current expenses of said department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1922.

Appropriates the sum of \$18,600.00 for the salaries and expenses of said department for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1923.

ACT NO. 531.

Approved March 26, 1921.

An Act to make appropriation for the collection of relics, muster rolls and historical records to perpetuate the part taken by the Confederate soldiers of Arkansas in the war between the States.

Appropriates the sum of \$1,000.00 for
