The GRAPHIC has never been the possessor of a city contract or fortunate enough to secure any of the emoluments arising from one. And we are not crying about it, either.

THE Sunday GRAPHIC reported exclusively yesterday the important fact that Messrs. Covington & Harrison would put in a bid for the city lighting and that they would build the electric street railway. This was the most important bit of information of the day to Pine Bluffians, and a subject that they were anxious about, yet the daily GRAPHIC was the only paper appearing in this city Sunday morning that carried the glad tidings to the people. Other items appearing exclusively in the Sunday issue, were a batch of interesting items from the Cotton Belt shops, East End improvement notes, program for the Song Service at the Methodist church, real estate transfers for the past week, "Stories of the Town," and social and local items too numerous to mention. The GRAPHIC again demonstrated the fact that it occupies a unique and exclusive field in local Sunday journalism.

### NEWS BRIEFS.

Nineteen persons lost their lives by the flooding of a colliery in Scotland.

Committee of the Senate has reported adversely on T. V. Powderly for Commissioner of Immigration.

The House Committee will report favorably on the Shaforth bill to give all arid lands to the States in which they are situated.

Prince Albert of Belgium and his suite called on President McKinley, who drove around town with the party.

President McKinley has stated there will be no war "until every possible appeal has been made with honor to God and man."

The scheme of American intervention in Cuban affairs which it is thought will be adopted embraces a proposition that Spain give Cuba such a measure of semi-independence as Canada enjoys, the United States guaranteeing the concession.

The War Department will abolish the Department of Texas and create another to cover the territory adjacent to the probable seat of war. Headquarters will be at Atlanta.

The Navy Department has about completed the deal for the purchase of the new Brazilian warships.

The construction of three new warships of the stanchest type has been authorized by the House Committee on Naval Affairs. Four dry docks will also be constructed, capable of receiving the largest vessels. It will be at least two years before the new vessels can be put in commission. One of them will be named the Maine. They will cost about \$5,000,000 each.

The War Department has ordered all forts from Galveston to Boston to be manned. The movement of the troops will begin in forty-eight hours.

Ex-Consul Adams, just returned from Cadiz, says Spain is bankrupt and in no condition to go to war.

Ex-Gov. P. H. Bell, of Texas, is dead.

The House committee has favorably reported a bill making the term of Congressmen four years.

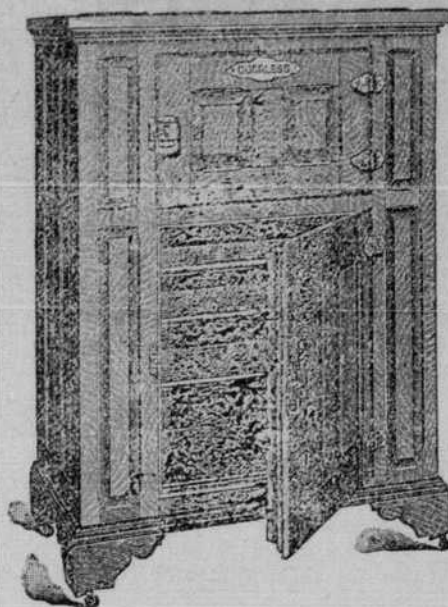
