The announcement of Hon. W. T. Woodriddle as a candidate for County and Probate Judge appears in the announcement column of today's issue. Mr. Woodriddle, although a little late in announcing his candidacy, is well-known to the people and will make a most formidable candidate. He is one of the leading lawyers of the Pine Bluff bar and pre-eminently qualified for the position to which he aspires.
