"Uncle Nat," an old colored man who has been confined in the Jefferson county poor house in the extreme western part of the city for the past few years, Tuesday decided to leave that place, but for what reason the keeper is not aware.

Late in the afternoon he slipped off from the house and his absence was not discovered until late in the night. The matter was reported to the police, who made a thorough search for the escaped inmate. Early this (Wednesday) morning the police received a telephone message from some resident in the West End stating that an old colored man was lying near the St. Louis Stave Mill and it was thought he was dead. An investigation proved the person to be old "Uncle Nat," who had doubtless laid down to sleep the night before. He was badly frozen and could not utter a word. Medical aid was rendered and he is now resting easy at the poor house.

CAESAR'S ASSASSIN

Believed to Now Languish Behind Jail Bars.

Jim Boyd, a negro who lives near Sherrill, now languishes behind jail bars charged with the assassination of L. M. Ceaser, a murder fresh within the minds of our readers.

Harrison Roberts, another negro, is also under arrest as an accessory.

Jim Boyd's arrest came about in the following manner. Roberts has for sometime been confined in jail on the charge of robbery, and when arrested, said that he was in custody because of Ceaser's murder. This casual remark gave a clew to the dastardly deed. Under pressure as to what he knew about Ceaser's murder, Roberts is said to have told the whole story of how Jim Boyd tried to hire him to do the deed, and not being successful, Boyd is said to have committed the murder alone, and then fled to Sherrill on a mule. Boyd was then brought before the grand jury to testify against Roberts, but as soon as he left the jury room was arrested on the charge of murdering Ceaser. We understand that the officers are in possession of the whole story of Ceaser's assassination, and a confession is expected.
