## COSTLY FREIGHT WRECK

Occurred on the Cotton Belt Monday  
Between Eagle Mills and Camden

Monday morning, at about 10:40 o'clock, the southbound fast freight No. 15 on the Cotton Belt road, was wrecked about 65 miles South of this city between Eagle Mills and Camden and all the Cotton Belt trains were from 8 to 10 hours late.

The train was under fast speed when the sand board fell, throwing fifteen large box cars in the ditch, demolishing four loaded cars and heavily damaging the big mogul engine. Poles were torn down for some distance and wires rendered helpless. The wrecker with all its hands and extra help left here immediately for the scene. It took until a late hour Monday night to properly clear the track. Among the wrecker's cargo were seventy-five heavy steel rails and over a 1000 ties, which were ordered for repairing the track. The rails were badly torn up for many hundred feet. Two boboos were the only persons in the wreck that received injuries. One of them had his leg mashed off and the other his head crushed. Their names are unknown.

Mr. A. D. Bland, an employe of the boiler department at the Cotton Belt shops, followed the remains of his loving and devoted wife to their last resting place in Bellwood cemetery yesterday morning. He buried a child Saturday, and has lost three children and their mother within twelve months, having only two of his little ones left. He has the sincere sympathy of the community in his unusual and deep bereavement.

A slight wreck occurred at the foot of Main street on Third avenue this morning. A box car was overturned and badly damaged. It was soon raised and taken to the shops for repairs.

The funeral of the late Judge T. F. Sorrells, which took place from the Main street Methodist church Monday afternoon, was one of the largest attended affairs of its kind to take place in Pine Bluff. The floral offerings were many and exquisite.

### Female Students in Germany.

In Germany the number of girl graduates is increasing in a remarkable fashion. Three years ago the ten great schools had on their books 177 female students. At the end of 1897 the total had risen to 347, and whereas in the previous year the girl students were mainly concentrated in Berlin, every university except Munster contributed to the roll of female graduates. At the beginning of this year the total had again increased to 400. Philology and philosophy are the favorite subjects of the girl graduates, history, art and natural science coming next in order of preference.

### Family Driven Mad.

An extraordinary case of madness, in which all members of a family, consisting of father, mother and four children, were simultaneously afflicted, has occurred at Stavelot. A party of strolling gypsies, who undertook to tell the father's fortune by means of cards, declared that he would be killed while serving in the army, and this prediction so impressed him and his family that in the course of the same day they all developed signs of wavering reason, and before long had to be put under restraint. The gypsies, who were the source of the trouble, were arrested by the German police while crossing the frontier from Belgium.

### An Intrenching Tool.

### Skating on Water.

According to Prof. J. Joly of Trinity College, Dublin, a skater really glides about on a narrow film of water, continually forming under the skate, and resuming the solid form when relieved of pressure. He shows that the pressure under the sharp edge of the skate, along the short portion of the steel curve which is at any moment in contact, is great enough to liquefy a thin line of ice, and this gives the skate its "bite." When the ice is very cold, the pressure is sometimes inadequate to reduce the melting point sufficiently, and then, as all skaters know, it is difficult to make the skate bite. For very cold ice Prof. Joly recommends "hollow ground" skates, because the effective pressure increases with the thickness of the edge.

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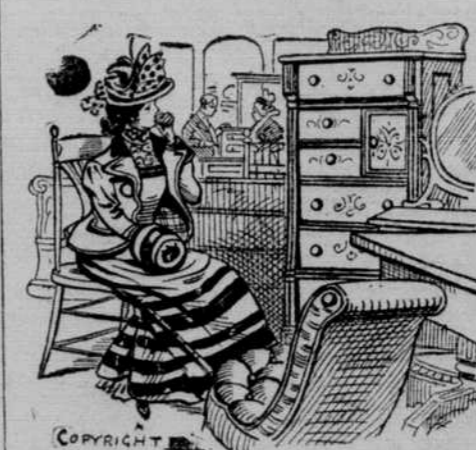
