CHARLES G. SPENCER MAKES FINE RECORD

Maintains Average of .9678 for 12 Years at Traps.

He Also Holds Professional Championship of United States and Canada—Consistency Has Been Feature of His Work.

One of the most remarkable records ever made in trapshooting is that held by Charles G. Spencer of St. Louis. In 12 years Spencer, who is a professional, has shot at 64,745 targets and has made a grand average of .9678. No other professional has approached

this mark. He holds the professional championship of the United States and Canada, having won the title in open competition.

The feature of his work at the traps has not been the averages made by him in single years, but his consistently good work over a stretch of years. He has led the professional trapshooters twice, averaging better than 97 per cent on those occasions, and never has he fallen below.

Some years ago he broke 565 straight targets in one tournament, which still stands as a world's record for one shoot. Last year he shot at more than 11,000 targets and averaged .9659. He won the Hazard doubles target trophy, emblematic of the world's championship, and created a new world's record in winning the title. He broke 311 straight targets in one shoot, the best mark of the year; in fact, he broke 410 straight in that shoot, but the other 99 were from 18 yards and were not required; therefore, his 311 stands as the record.
