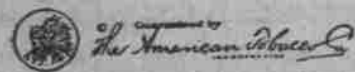

NOTICE OF MEETING

September 17, 1921
Pursuant to call the Board of Supervisors, of Navajo County, met this day in special session. All of the members of the Board and the Clerk were present.
The meeting was called for the purpose of reconsidering the location of a part of the proposed Winslow, Keams Canyon road, and a delegation of taxpayers from Winslow, together with Mr. Daniels, Indian Agent from Keams Canyon, were present and presented their views as to the most feasible route to follow.
After hearing the honorable delegation, the Board decided to appoint new viewers to inspect the proposed route, and the Highway Commission were accordingly notified to let no new contracts on the said highway until the matter is adjusted.
The matter of the proposed change has been pending for some time and viewers have been appointed to view out the road several times, the latest report being that of a board of viewers under date of Sept. 7, 1922 which, however, did not reach this office until after the date of this minute. This board of viewers disapproved any changes in the roads as originally approved, with the exception, if feasible, to change the line west, north of Cedar Springs in order to make connections with the new Keams Canyon road as near as possible.
There appearing to be no further business upon motion duly carried the Board adjourned.

wages and working conditions of railroad employes shall be readjusted downward as in other industry, and that working agreement which permit railroad employes to draw pay when not actually working, or fifty per cent more than their present high rate for all time after eight hours, shall be cancelled.

The public is watching closely the attitude of the U. S. Railroad Labor Board. If this Board takes the necessary action in revising wages and in eliminating from working agreements provisions which permitted such abuses as overtime after the first eight hours at time and a half whether sleeping or working, the public will sustain it. If it fails, the public will not only condemn it but very probably wipe it out.

The people will not be trifled with either by railroad employes or the Labor Board. They will not be deterred, as in the days of the Adamson fiasco, by threats of a strike. In the first place there never was a better time to clean house. The country is filled with idle men and there will be plenty to fill all vacancies. In the second place the people, and not a few agitators, are going to continue to run this country, for the people are paying the bill.
